Not only was a talented young player hurt by this two-handed chop. So were area hockey fans, who eagerly anticipated a Milton-Bramalea West Conference finals.


Sure it may still happen, but almost definitely without the lustre and intensity that these clubs displayed in their seven-game clash two years ago.

Assuming the Merchants are at peak efficiency, you can throw competitiveness out the window as well.

Cammalleri had figured in exactly 40 per cent of his club's scoring, with 31 goals and 103 points. Without his zip and creativeness, the Blues really don't stand a chance.

Of course they've still got Kyle Amyotte — who's always productive and frequently outstanding — but now he'll be the chief

focus of the three-peat minded Merchants and will no doubt be suffocated by defensive coverage throughout the potential series.

Bramalea has other quality gunners like Anthony Aquino and Chris Sebastian, but none who seem capable of elevating the team like Cammalleri and Amyotte have this year and were expected to do in the post-season.

And if the Blues don't pose a serious threat to Milton's title defence, who does?

Brampton, Burlington and Oakville have occasionally given them a run but aren't well-round or determined enough to be more than a nuisance when Milton bears down and has its collective game face on.

Face it fans, a cakewalk to the West Conference crown is not only possible but highly probable. Thank goodness that Rayside-Balfour is still waiting in the wings.

New playoff format

This season's playoff run will feature a couple of changes, which may not amount to much for the Merchants but are nevertheless worth mentioning.

Firstly, the late stages of the Provincial Jr. A playdowns will feature a "lucky loser" — or so it has become known around local hockey circles.

Essentially, one of the teams defeated in the three conference finals will return as the fourth entry for the semifinal round.

This will be the club with the best winning percentage in the post-season. Though likely unnecessary, the scenario favours an opportunistic Milton team that has earned a total of five series sweeps during their last two playoff runs.

The new format doesn't sit well with many coaches and fans, who don't believe in second chances. Who can blame them? Once a team loses they should hit the golf course, plain and sim-

It's one thing to employ this system if no other options are available, but you've got Rayside-Balfour who'll be long since done their Northern League playdowns (which comprise two measly rounds) by the time the Provincial Jr. A semis roll around and could easily be slotted in as the fourth entry.

But of course, that would make too much sense.

Instead the Provincial League victor will have to play more than twice as many games as Rayside. So much for fairness.

Also, first round play this year will be trimmed back to a bestof-five.

Finally, a move in the right direction.

These initial, lengthy mismatches were always boring and often mind numbing to watch. But since the Merchants will likely earn a sweep either way, one less game isn't that big a deal.
