Tough G'town makes Milton work for wins



Milton Merchant stars returned to action and renewed the club's winning ways.

Daniel Jacques, seeing his first playoff games this past weekend, provided phenomenal goaltending to trim Georgetown with consecutive 2-1 decisions.

Meanwhile, captain Kevin O'Flaherty — returning

from a battle with strep throat - buried both goals in Sunday's victory.

These efforts put the team back on top in the best-of-. seven West Conference semifinals.

The defending provincial champs enjoy a 3-1 stranglehold on the series and host game five tonight at Memorial Arena.

Said Jacques, "After being out for a while it was nice to come back and make an impact. Of course it really doesn't matter who's in net,

just that we go with the guy that's hot and win the game." Sunday at Gordon Alcott Arena in front of 1,500

screaming fans, the veteran tender turned aside 27 of 28 shots while O'Flaherty scored 3:25 into the contest and again midway through the third period to deliver the win.

The go-ahead marker came on a nifty bottom shelf deke that caught Raiders' Jeff Hladysh going the wrong way.

Lead number one was established with an upstairs deflection on a long distance centering pass.

Assisting each time was Geoff Schomogyi, who tops playoff production with five goals and a dozen total points.

Milton's key to success in round two remains with their ability to neutralize the Raiders' first line, which includes league scoring leader Stace Page and feisty former Merchant Jeff Seeds.

They have done so three times and — not surprisingly — triumphed in each case. Their only post-season glitch so far came in game two when substandard > defence and discipline resulted in a 6-4 loss.

Seeds tallied twice and added a pair of assists to send Georgetown on the way to victory — their first against Milton in the playoffs since 1992.

"I just hope they (the Merchants) don't take it personally," said Seeds after his team's win. "I'm just doing whatever I have to do. It's the same way I played with them."

One night later at home the Merchants needed Jacques' inspired cage work plus a two-goal effort by rugged winger Rob Meanchoff to escape with the win.

Georgetown demonstrated superior forechecking and positional play throughout the contest. Their lone tally came off the stick of call-up Ryan Hotham.

Meanchoff's winner came by way of a somewhat flukey upstairs wrister — which visiting goalie David Digironimo was completely unprepared for — with seven minutes left to play.


Merchants' skipper Marty Williamson said he expected a serious challenge from Georgetown, but admits back-to-back low scoring games have come as

They're battling us hard and I think this will help our team down the road."

Merchant notes: If necessary, game six will be played Thursday in Georgetown while game seven is set for Friday at Memorial Arena.

Bittersweet battle for title

After another lengthy wait for both competitors and one more overtime clash, Heffron finally surrendered the title and settled for his second silver in as many provincial championship appearances.
