

Negotiations are underway to bring a new baby doctor on board at Milton District Hospital.

Successful interviews with two candidates last Sunday have put Halton Healthcare Services (HHS) into bargaining mode, reported search committee chair and associate chief of staff Dr. Don Robertson.

HHS runs the amalgamated Milton District and Oakville Trafalgar Memorial hospitals.

"We'd be happy with either person," said Dr. Robertson. "As far as we're concerned they'd both be excellent choices."

If an obstetrician is hired soon, Milton's baby." baby ward could re-open as early as this summer, he said.

The ward shut down November 1 of last year after Dr. Sushil Suppal left his post as Milton's only full-time obstetrician.

At the time, he had held the position for eight years and was on call 24 hours a day. He withdrew from the job after his contract expired.
