Y2K will cost board \$332,000

Ongoing efforts to avoid Y2K computer problems will cost the Halton District School Board at least \$332,000.

The board approved allocating that sum from its working reserve recently, following a recommendation by superintendent Keith Johnson.

He noted much of the work to avoid problems in 2000 has been done by staff, but extra help had to be contracted.

"The identification, planning and implementation of year 2000 solutions continues to be the largest single undertaking the board has experienced in the last 15 years," said Mr. Johnson in his information report. "Hardware and software application replacement is a very people-intensive activity."

Of the reserve funds approved, \$162,000 will go toward contract staff helping with upgrades and implementations.

Gevaert no-show at most council meetings

Ward 3 residents may be justified if they feel neglected since an extended work assignment in Israel has made Councillor Lieven Gevaert a virtual stranger in council chambers.

"Being here is not perfection for my constituents," admitted Mr. Gevaert, calling The Champion at 11 p.m. Israel time. "I can do a better job when I'm home. Let's not kid ourselves."

Since taking on work as a consultant for a firm in Israel last August, Mr. Gevaert has been all but missing in action at Town committee and council meetings.

Attendance records show that Mr. Gevaert managed to make only 15 out of 23 administration and planning committee meetings in 1998.

That put him just one or two meetings ahead of Councillors Rick Day and Rick Malboeuf, neither of whom are even part of the committee.

Neither is councillor Art Melanson, who nonetheless managed to show up every
