Nice, late gift for Bramalea's Blues

f the Merchants wish to hold on to their remaining titles, they can ill afford another giveaway like the one Tuesday night at Memorial Arena.

The defending provincial Jr. A. champions — who have already relinquished their conference crown and are now playing the role of underdog — coughed up a 3-1 lead on Bramalea in the last few minutes of regulation time.

Milton then surrendered a third straight goal 5:09 into sudden death for their most heartbreaking loss of the playoffs.

· This knotted the league finals at one win apiece and allowed the Blues, who are intent on emptying their rivals' trophy case this spring, to regain both momentum and home ice advantage in the best-of-seven rematch, which continues tonight at Victoria Park Arena.

Milton's late collapse spoiled what was otherwise an inspiring performance, arguably their best within the past couple of weeks.

Through much of the evening the Merchants were in clear control, with sharp goaltending by Jeremy Wenzel, a fierce checking game and the resurgence of their powerplay, which accounted for all three goals.

The Merchants also managed to neutralize their opponents' speed while players like Mark Beisel, Ed McGrane and Ryan Robichaud sacrificed their bodies in order to win corner battles and sustain pressure in the offensive zone.

A few too many rash penalties down the stretch, however, would open the door for Bramalea's uprising.

Captain Kyle Amyotte drew his visitors within one on the man advantage, burying a blueline shot through traffic at 14:25.


Moments later returning spark plug John DiBatista drilled a spinning blast in the bottom shelf for the equalizer.

The stage was then set for defenceman Darryl Baker, who capped the Blues' comeback win by beating Wenzel with an upstairs wrist shot midway through the first overtime session.

Also scoring for the winners was Roberto Orofiamma, with David Peca picking up a pair of assists. Rookie T.J. Aceti backstopped the club to victory, making 26 saves along the way.

Milton used the point to tally twice in the second and looked to be headed towards their first decisive playoff win against Bramalea.

Registering goals 18 minutes apart in the middle frame were captain Kevin O'Flaherty and Ryan Carrigan, who also


drew two helpers for his second threepoint effort in post season play.
