Jail work right on schedule

The Maplehurst expansion is on schedule and well into its second phase — the main construction of the 'super-jail'.

A temporary inmate admitting and discharge area and health care facilities were recently completed in phase one.

Minimal inclement weather is making building easier for the 625 construction workers, said superintendent Michael Stephenson.

"The project is proceeding according to the work schedule that the contractor has set out," he said. "There have been no major road blocks."

The second phase includes the construction of the four major cell units for males as well as the female units and food services facilities.

The new administration building, admitting and discharge area and central control unit are also being

erected in phase two, which is expected to be completed by next April.

The third phase will see the remodeling of the female admitting and discharge area and health care facilities for both men and women. The entire project is expected to be completed by April, 2001.

Security concerns surrounding the continued operation of both holding and correctional centres while undergoing major construction are being addressed on an ongoing basis, said local project manager Christina Danylchenko.

She said all parties involved in the project are cooperating well to ensure that the required security measures are followed. "We have to keep disruption of prison operation as minimal as possible."

The correctional facility on Martin Street will house more than 1,600 male and female prisoners requiring up to maximum security for all types of crimes.

The concept is unprecedented in Canada.



Slot start pushed back

The introduction of slot machines at Mohawk Raceway has been pushed back a month.

Due to a series of design changes to accommodate facilities, the 750 one-armed bandits are now expected to be operational at the Campbellville track in mid-July, said Nick Eaves, vice-president of marketing for the Ontario Jockey Club (OJC).

The target date for opening had been lune

The OJC is currently implementing a \$17 million renovation that includes a new front entrance and floor in the slot machine area, Mr. Eaves said.

Outside, new signs will be installed and improvements will be made to the parking lot.

Mr. Eaves said the Ontario Lottery Corporation, the slot machine operator, expects about 2,000 people will come through the door just to play the onearmed bandits.

The OJC hopes the influx of visitors will arouse more interest in horse racing.

For now, the track will hold its regular 100 days of live racing, but simulcast wagering will be open seven days a week, year-round, except on Christmas Eve and Christmas Day, Mr. Eaves said.

Slot machine operation is expected to run from 11 a.m. to 3 a.m. daily.







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
