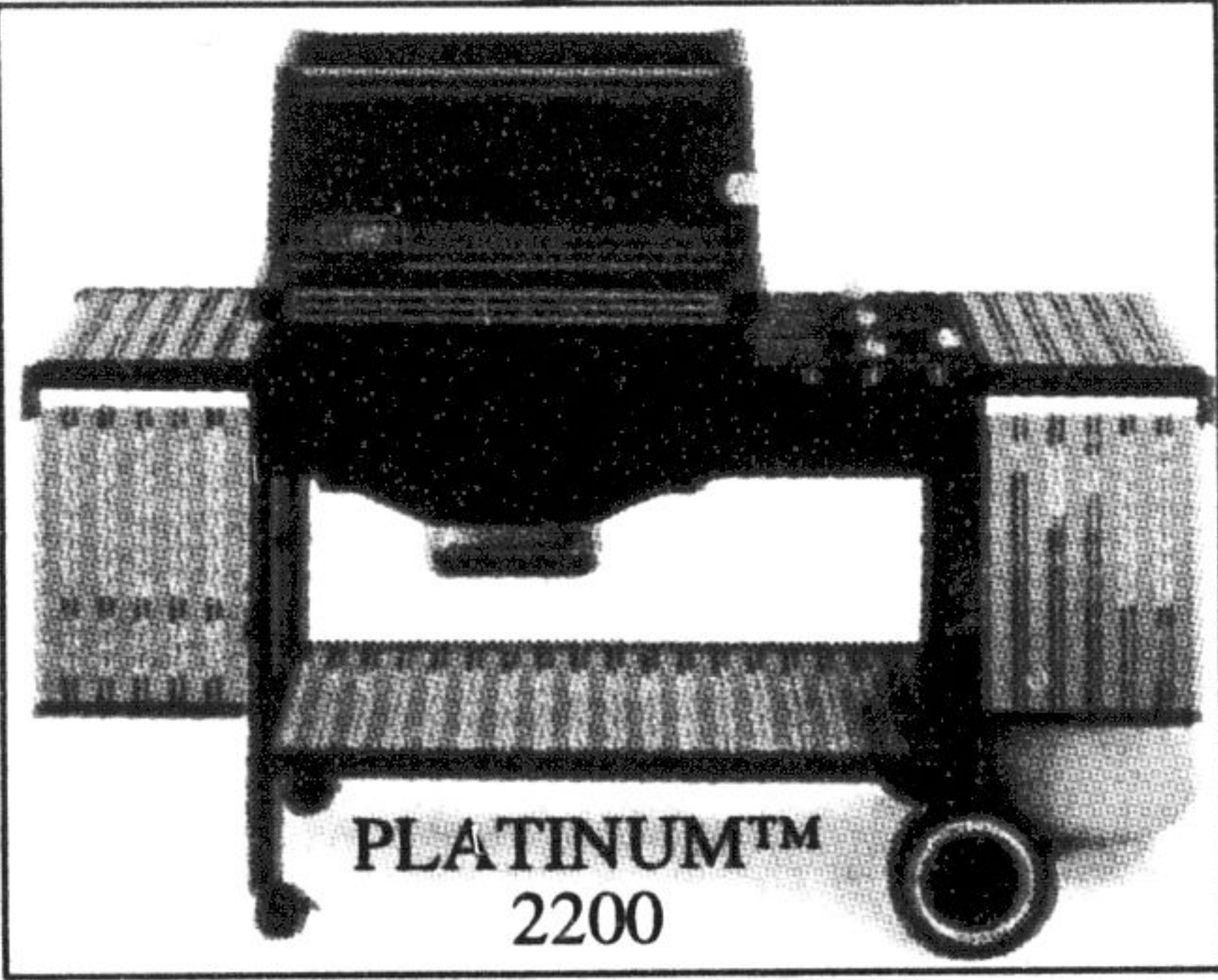


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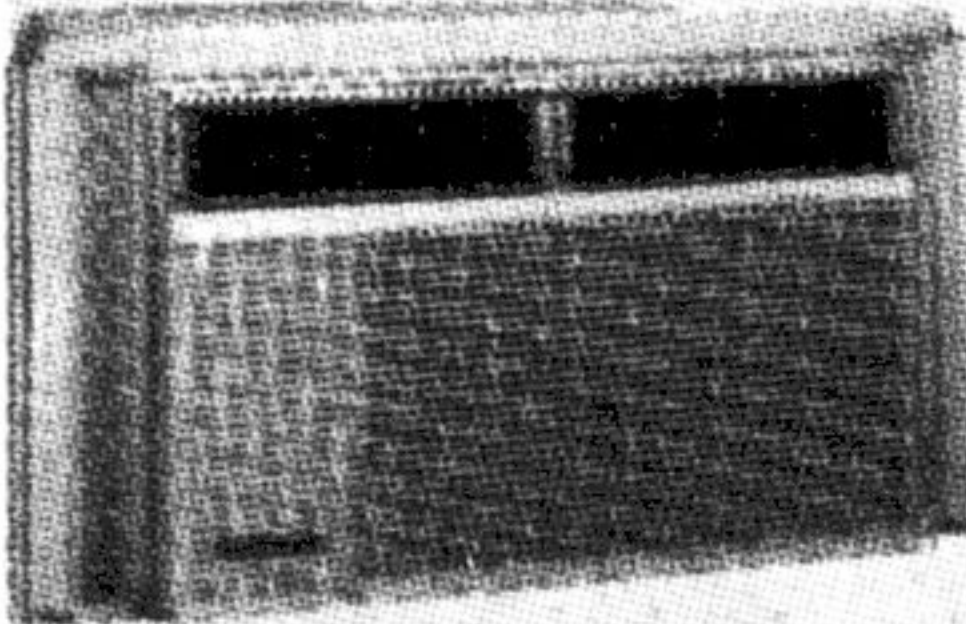


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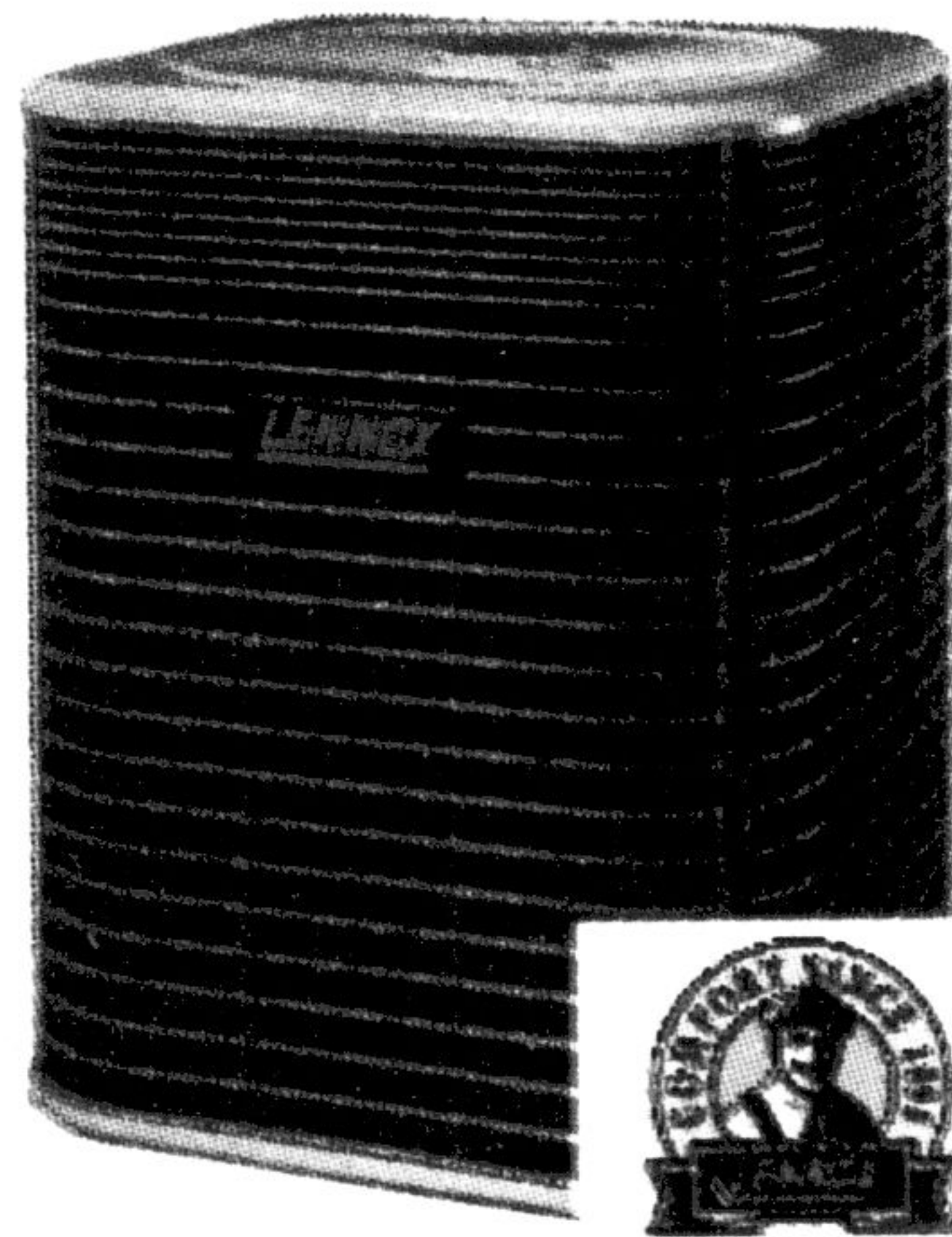


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Former student wants to remember Holy Rosary

The smell of lilacs in church and singing Christmas songs on CFRB radio with her classmates.

Those are just two memories that Milton's Joan White has treasured of her years at Holy Rosary School.

Now, with the school poised to be razed this summer, she is hoping for one more chance to revisit the old days with former students and educators.

To that end, she is helping organize a reunion.

It will take place at the school gym on Saturday, May 29 from 6:30 until 11:30 P.M.

The \$5 tickets are being sold at Gold Connection and The Key Centre.

Proceeds will go towards books and other educational supplies for the new school.

The original Holy Rosary opened in 1954 and is set to be torn down this July.

Ms White attended the school from 1965-1972.

At that time, events such as the annual May crowning were still held.

"We had them every year, since May is the month of (The Virgin) Mary," said Ms White.

The idea was to select a young student to be Mary, who would then be crowned with a wreath of flowers.

"The smell of lilacs was just rampant in the church," recalled Ms White.

Ms White has been working to ensure that former students and teachers will have a chance to wander the halls again at the reunion and relive those memories.

"The school is getting torn down and no one was thinking of doing anything," she said.

Ms White tested the idea of a reunion by asking a cousin who sits on the school's parent council to float the suggestion at a meeting.

The response was good. Now word is spreading through Catholic school board newsletters, notices on church billboards and word of mouth.

Many former students have not left town, said Ms White.

"I see people going through the school with their kids who are at Holy Rosary now," said Ms White, whose own children attend the school. "My grade eight teacher is still there."

A supply teacher Ms White recalls from her years at the school taught her own child not long ago.

"It was nice going there and having her teach my kids," she said.

Something had to be done to commemorate the old school, said Ms White.

"It was the only separate school in town, I believe, for 20 years," she said. "All of my family went there. The school's important, I think."

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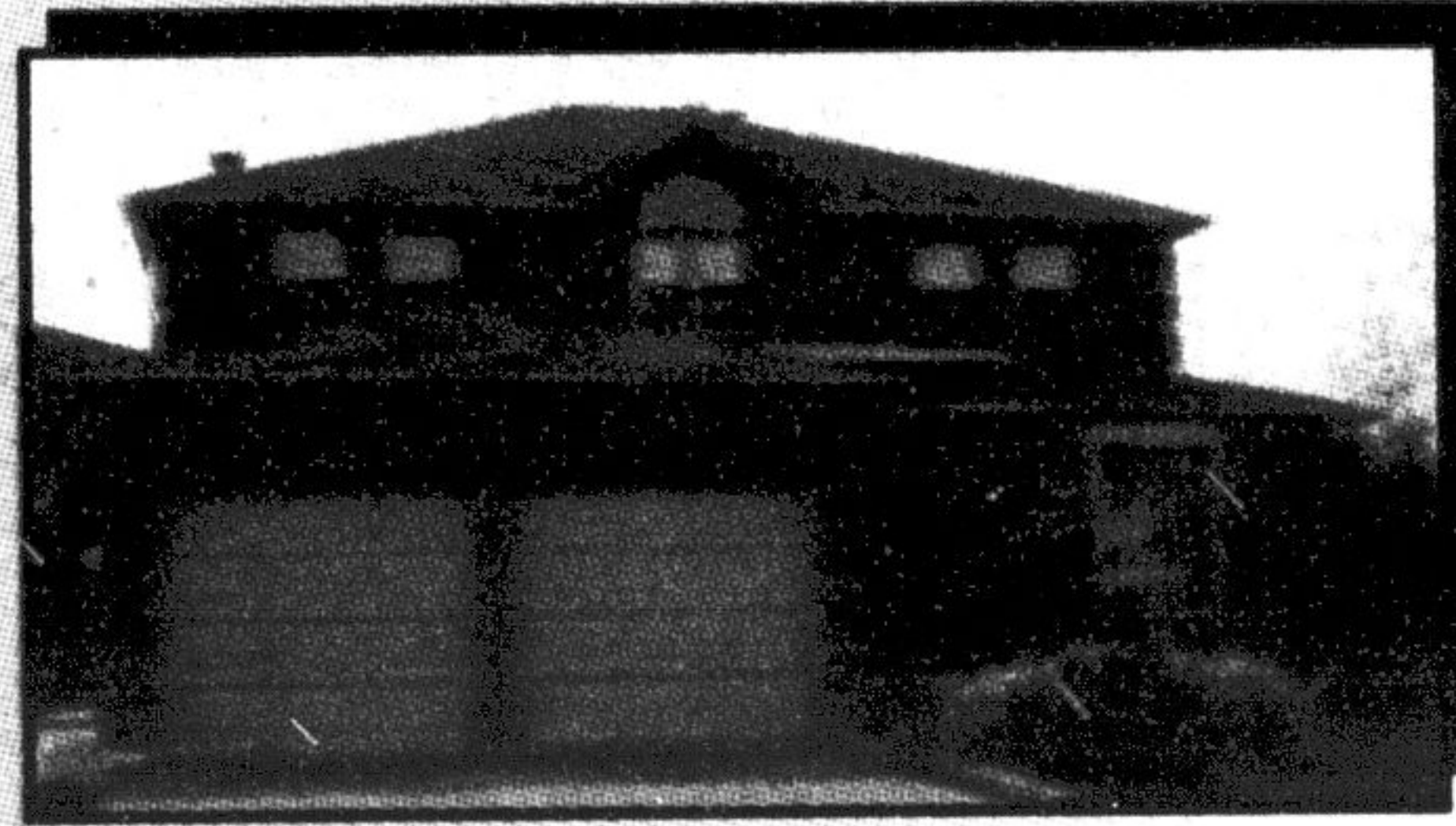
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
