those riches with tough decisions to ensure that strength remains."

Howard Hampton started as the dark horse in the debate and ended by tossing Mr. McGuinty out of the running, said NDP candidate Jay Jackson.

"The race was clearly between the Tories and the NDP," he said. "I think the Liberals came in third."

A limp performance by Mr. McGuinty served

to highlight that party's flimsy policies, said Mr. Jackson.

Also, Mr. Harris' emphasis on tax cuts may have sliced Conservative credibility in the debate, said Mr. Jackson.

"Mr. Harris is basically staying the course and hoping people will believe in his phony tax cuts again," said Mr. Jackson.

In contrast, Mr. Hampton delivered the real goods, he said.

"Our party leader came out quite well," said

Mr. Jackson. "He made some significant points."

A strong showing by Mr. McGuinty during the debate may have changed people's thinking about the Liberal party leader, said Halton Liberal candidate Mohan Anand.

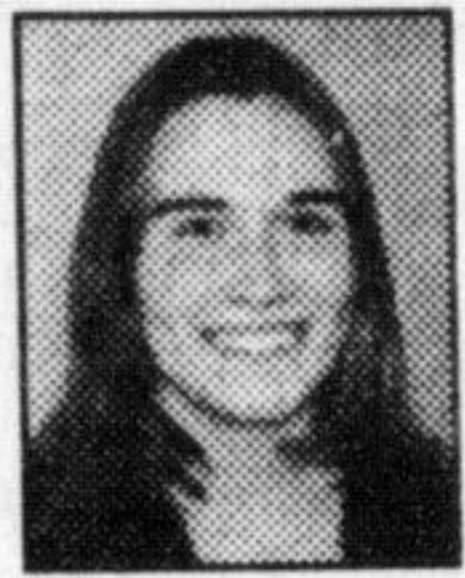
"I think everyone had the assumption that the worst performance would be from Dalton McGuinty, but I think he did very well," he said. "He held his own, he didn't give in. He showed he could perform under pressure."

Far from flip-flopping on issues, Mr.

McGuinty came across as a strong leader, said Mr. Anand.

"He was tenacious. He stuck to his statements and policies. Many people who at one time may not have known if he was up to the job — I think he dispelled those fears. I think he proved he was up to the job."

Mr. Anand denied that his party lacks policies, stating that health care, education and the environment are its primary priorities. Only if there is extra money will tax cuts factor in.
