


### WANT TO GET MARRIED - ON A CARIBBEAN ISLAND?

# Driver Waples beats rush hour traffic

For more than half the \$67,000 final of the Mohawk Pacing Series last Saturday, Hornby's Randy Waples must have thought he was in the middle of rush hour on the Don Valley Parkway.

## Superb comeback too little, too late E.C. Drury's girls softball team has scored early and often to win most regular season games this spring.

However, at Lions Sport Park Tuesday their efforts were too little and too late.

The Spartans staged a remarkable comeback bid against the undefeated St. Thomas Aquinas Raiders of Oakville, scoring a whopping seven runs in the fifth inning despite missing key sluggers Nicole May and Melissa Parcels.

But an uncharacteristically slow start — with just one run over the first four frames — eventually cost Drury a 10-8 defeat and dropped them to 5-2 on the season for second place in Halton's Volpe Division.

In one of their more interesting outings in recent years, EC had to contend with heavy winds and a brief rain delay plus the on-again, off-again pitching of Sabrina Snow.

St. Thomas Aquinas' ace hurler worked five separate stints on the mound — yet still faced the allotted 12 batters --- in order to battle the top opposing hitters and maximize her club's chances of victory.

The strategy, rather confusing and frustrating at times for the Spartans, proved effective — at least through the early going.

After that the locals, refusing to fold up their tents, rallied from a huge 10-1 deficit to make things quite exciting.


Anne Jamieson began and ended their fifth inning explosion with RBI singles.
