# Councillors spar as developer shot down

H.D. Investments has lost another round in a battle over development at the E.C Drury school complex.

But procedural wrangling and sniping among bitterly divided Milton councillors clouded the controversial decision Monday night.

A throng jammed the chamber as councillors backed a committee decision quashing an in-depth report on the proposed development.

It involves building a seniors' retirement subdivision on the site.

That would effectively kibosh the proposal at the Town level, though developers could launch an appeal to the Ontario Municipal Board.

A 180-bed nursing home is still under consideration for the 33-acre parcel of land, the largest remaining green space in urban Milton.

The first fracas erupted after Councillor Art Melanson held a vote approving the committee decision without hearing from 10 delegations listed to speak on the issue.

Mr. Melanson was serving as acting mayor in the absence of Gord Krantz, away at a conference.

The vote infuriated Councillor Rick Day, who said that it should have been called only after the delegations had been heard.

"I've never seen this before, when someone was listed as a deputation and was told they can't speak," he said. "It's unheard of, Mr. chairman. Unheard of."

The delegates had all been given that chance at a May 26 public meeting on the issue, retorted Councillor John Challinor.

"Everyone who is listed here had an opportunity to come forward, it was a public meeting," he said. "Councillor Day is grandstanding on this. Procedure has been followed."

Once the vote has been cast, the case is closed, said

"After five hours of deliberation (on May 26) there was a resolution voted on," he recalled. "All we've done is approve the labours done the other night. It seems to me this is due process."

Councillor Rick Malboeuf called for a new vote after accusing his colleagues of rushing the first one.

A new vote was vehemently opposed by Mr. Challinor.

"If you want to listen to the delegations, that's one thing," he said. "But we voted on this."

At the suggestion of Councillor Wally Hunter, delegates were invited to speak provided they added new points to the debate instead of simply covering old ground.

No sooner had the 10 delegates wrapped up than a second controversy exploded over the possibility of reconsidering the earlier vote.

A reconsideration — which would require a twothirds vote to pass — would effectively re-open the issue, allowing councillors to vote again on the matter.

The vote was fair and square the first time, said Mr. Challinor.

"The videotape is right there," he said, pointing to the cable television crew. "We voted on this tonight."

Food Poisoning

Planning a family picnic this weekend? Some 6,000 to 10,000 cases of confirmed food poisoning are documented each year in Canada. Backyard barbecues, picnics and hot weather increase the chance of food poisoning. Safe food can become unsafe if left for just two hours in the temperature range above

4°C (40°F), which is normal refrigeration temperature, and below 60°C (140°F). Keep cold food cold and hot food hot!
