## Sweep is marred by a skirmish

So far, so good — and so long Wallaceburg.

The Jr. B Mavericks delivered some of their finest lacrosse in franchise history over a five-day period to sweep the highly aggressive Red Devils 3-0 in opening round playoff action.

But their inspired performance was just half of the story in this best-of-five series — which was marred by a game two altercation in Wallaceburg Sunday between Milton players and a few hometown spectators.


In the middle of the skirmish was Maverick goalie Andrew Dowdell, who claims that one particular fan had been yelling at skipper Jim Leworthy throughout the second period and was about to take a swing at him as the team was heading to the lobby at intermission.

Going outside to keep cool between periods is not uncommon for lacrosse teams — who in certain arenas have to walk by fans to exit the building.

Looking to protect his coach, as he contends, Dowdell pushed Leworthy aside and wound up embroiled in a mini wrestling match with the fan.

Other spectators also became involved, as did fellow visiting players including Craig Hedley and Darryl Brown. Police had to be called in and while threatened to be stopped, the game was completed under protest by Wallaceburg general manager Sheldon Parsons.

"What I saw was two Milton players enter the fan area and

start fighting with our fans," said the Red Devils' GM, whose players and coaching staff were in their own dressing room at the time and only became aware of the incident after it was over. "That's a nono. They should have been expelled (from the series)."

Argued Dowdell, "We were just going outside and this guy was about to hit coach Leworthy, so I stepped in and ended up on the floor. You've got to be willing to spill blood for each other, even the coach."

While who was truly to blame for the incident remains up for debate — and possibly up for review by league officials — there was no question
