# Slots are ready for action at Mohawk

The much-anticipated operation of slot machines at Mohawk Raceway is expected by the end of the week as preparations are in the final stage.

At press time yesterday, an invitationonly pre-opening for the media and dignitaries was to be held tonight (Tuesday).

Then the doors were expected to be open to the public within the next couple of days, a spokesman from the Ontario Lottery Corporation (OLC) said Monday.

In the first such gaming partnership between the Ontario Jockey Club (OJC) and the OLC, 750 slot machines will open at the Campbellville race track. The OLC will run the operation.

Meanwhile, the OJC will operate yearround simulcast wagering in addition to its regular schedule of live racing.

Slot machine operation is expected to run from 11 a.m. to 2 a.m. daily.

## A scam attempt raises suspicions

Halton Regional Police are warning citizens to beware of telephone fraud artists following a close call in Milton.

A King Street woman received an August 4 phone call from a person identifying himself as a Toronto police officer. The caller asked the woman for personal financial information.

However, the wise woman asked for a return telephone number, which turned out to be a residential number randomly given by the fraud artist.

Det. Sgt. Jackie Gordon said that's exactly what all citizens should do in the same situation.

"She handled the situation very appropriately," she said. "There's no doubt in my mind that this was an attempt to get information from these people."

She said people should ask for a return phone number from the caller and check the number in the phone book to ensure it's the right one for the party represented.
