# Opposition is still jinxed in the opener

Opening night-mares continue to haunt visitors who dare enter Memorial Arena.

The Jr. A Merchants, for a third time in as many years, kicked off the regular season by making things painful and distressing for their guests.

Milton's victims this fall were the mildly improved but still offensively challenged Mississauga Chargers — who were whitewashed 7-0 Friday.

Victory for the local club — who in their past three home openers combined have scored 10 times as many goals as the competition (30 for, three against) came in front of a rather sparse, silent crowd.

The blowout was highlighted by an impressive 33-save shutout performance by diminutive goaltender Luc Lamothe and a balanced attack that saw seven players bury the biscuit.

Milton tallied twice in each of the first two periods and then added insult to injury with three more in the final frame, including a shorthanded breakaway marker by Malcolm with five minutes remaining.

A 6-for-6 penalty killing campaign was another bright spot on the night. Helping neutralize the visitors' powerplay was team leader Chad Blundy. Also in line to be captain, he dropped back to the point for game one as rearguards Ken Robins and Mike Clarke were out nursing inflamed joints and a pulled groin respectively.

## Coach likes Sunday game

Skipper Marty Williamson was pleased with the decisive win — but not as much so as with his team's showing two nights later at Mississauga's Iceland Arena.

There they cranked it up a notch and thoroughly dismantled the North Conference Collingwood Blues 8-2 in Prospect Weekend play.

"They're supposed to be one of the top teams in that division and we took them apart," said the Milton bench boss. "We showed a lot of grit, won most of the battles and made some nice goals."

All this despite going with a shortened

lineup — after forward Peverley took a puck off his leg during warm-up and joined the already sidelined Clarke and Robins — and having to face former teammate Jeremy Wenzel.

The crafty cager was steady through the early going but eventually withered and allowed four unanswered goals in the third, the last three while his cohorts were shorthanded.
