

Madison Chemical on McGeachie Drive, which sports a garden created and maintained by employees, took home the Urban Commercial Award.

The garden, which features about 100 plants, was created in conjunction with the company's recent expansion, said Madison vice-president of finance and operations Kevin Brazier.

The Rural Commercial Award went to Trafalgar Golf and Country Club.

The winners each received a plaque and a one-year membership to the Milton and District Horticultural Society. The honourable mentions received a membership.

The awards presentation was held at the Royal Canadian Legion, where the organization regularly meets.


The officer, who also paid a visit to the Tremaine Road house party and had it shut down, observed injured and intoxicated youths at the Milton Heights scene, she said.
