Early drives don't get it done for Mustangs

Reaching the end zone twice on the first two plays of the year is enough to give any football team a confidence boost. But perhaps it's one that came a little too quickly and easily for the senior Mustangs' own good.

Ed Stavnitzky has seen it before. A gridiron veteran for nearly two decades, he knows only too well how a false sense of security can develop from an initial taste of success.

"I've seen teams that score right away and think 'Hey, this is going to be a cakewalk'," said the new head coach for Milton District High School.

Whether it was a case of overconfidence or lack of experience, or in all likelihood a combination of the two, the local squad was silenced after their early offensive output and beaten 12-8 by the host Georgetown Rebels Friday in season opening play.

Following John Melito's 22-yard pass to Ian Robinson — who went another 40 yards for the major and then rushed for a twopoint convert - MD had only marginal success at driving the

While Robinson had some impressive gains, missed blocking assignments left Melito — currently filling in for injured pivot Jon Sprenger — open to a pair of sacks while a variety of other rookie mistakes cost them the shot at a game one victory.

"We had no penetration from the outside early on. Incidental penalties and fumbles, little things like that killed us today," remarked Stavnitzky. "We've got to fix some things at practice next week."

To Milton's credit, they did hold the host team scoreless through the second half with some fine tackles — by Corey Bowen, Will Hoey-Weston and Brett McClure — and strong pass protection.

Both Rebel touchdowns were delivered by leading rusher Andrew Hann. They came four minutes into the contest and midway through the second quarter, sandwiching the visitors' scor-

Melito connected on four of seven throws and collected 83 yards during the opening half before switching to an all-ground game that got the team within the 25-yard line twice.

The second time, they tried a fake punt pass and were nearly

Merchants run record to 5-0, crunching Caps

The Merchants' offensive onslaught continues to gain steam as the new season rolls on.

Scoring 19 times this past weekend, they put two more notches in the win column to remain unbeaten at 5-0.

Enjoying more chemistry than could possibly have been expected this early in the year — with so many new recruits in the lineup — they're averaging more than eight goals a game and have managed no less than seven on any single evening.

Friday at home that firepower burned Brampton 10-2. While the forward units worked wonders inside enemy lines, the blowout was due in part to a shockingly lethargic performance

by the so far uninspired Capitals — who heading into last night's tilt in Buffalo were still winless.
