

Mailman's quick action saves day

Don Ronan brought more than just the mail Thursday. The Canada Post letter carrier also delivered a helping hand and thwarted potential disaster on Hemlock Drive.

While across the street finishing his route around 1:30 p.m., he noticed a young boy running outside in his underwear.

Mental health open house


The Canadian Mental Health Association's Halton branch will host an afternoon open house Thursday at 217 Main St. E.
