

Even in defeat the Merchants refused to skate away empty-handed.


Milton's first blemish of the season, a 6-5 loss to the much improved Kilty Bees, was delivered Monday night at Hamilton's Mountain Arena.


The AA midgets' powerplay suffered a power outage at Memorial Arena Monday.
