# Ninth Line man tells council to stop sitting on fence

A burlap fence may shield a line of cedar trees on Bill Hill's Ninth Line property from winter salt spray.

But it won't protect Ninth Line residents from the encroachment of a booming city on one side and a growing town on the other, warned Councillor Rick Day.

Instead, Ninth Line, which straddles Mississauga and Milton, should be zoned as a development area, he suggested.

bours out of being the ham in the sandwich," said Mr. Day.

Concerns over the health of a line of cedar trees near his property has made Mr. Hill a repeat visitor to council chambers over the last few years.

The trees have been ailing due to winter salt kicked up by Ninth Line traffic, which has dramatically increased due to development on the Mississauga side.

To prevent further injury to the cedars, the Town agreed to erect a protective burlap fence each fall, to be taken down once spring arrives.

But a series of severe snow falls last year fol-"The solution is to get Mr. Hill and his neigh- lowed by snow removal procedures demolished the fence before winter wrapped up.

With the cold season fast approaching, Mr.

Hill made another trek to council chambers to ask the Town's community services committee for help.

"I want to save these trees," he said. "I would appreciate a solution to this problem."

A new burlap fence should be erected pronto, advised Councillor Brian Penman.

"We have an obligation and it is not an expensive obligation, I don't think," he said. "Mr. Hill should not have to come back every year for a few hundred dollars."

But Ninth Line's unique position between the two municipalities has caused delays in the past, as issues can sometimes bounce from one council to another before being resolved.

And burlap is not the answer if it can't survive the winter, Mr. Hill pointed out.

"Burlap is not going to solve the problem if we have a snowstorm like we did last year. Snow removal will just tear it down," he said.

"Can you guarantee we won't have another snow storm?"

Since last year's storms were unusually heavy, burlap fencing could be given another shot, said the Town's community services director Jennifer Reynolds.

"I think we'd like to see how it withstands this winter provided we don't get the amount of snow we did last winter," she said.


