## Merchants win another in OT

The Merchants' least experienced player is quickly becoming their most reliable performer in the clutch.

Richard Peverley — one of just two team members, and the only skater, without a full year of Jr. A hockey under his belt deposited a long range wrister 11 seconds in sudden death to beat Bramalea 4-3 Wednesday.

It was the second time in as many home games with the Blues in which the rookie winger provided overtime heroics — as well as the third occasion in eight days where he came up with the winning tally.

The 17-year-old, whose confidence level must be on the rise with so much crucial ice time lately, has lit the lamp five times in the past four games and now leads the team in game winning markers with four.

His latest goal was doubly significant — since it also gave Milton the win it needed to pull even with Georgetown for top spot in the Provincial Jr. A League's West Conference.
