Building schools in new areas would serve children better, said Mr. Petrusich.

Oakville Trustee Debbie Marklew opposed spending money on JK while

schools in her area need renovations, increased bus transportation and instructional assistants.

"The inequity of it is my main concern. Where are the dollars going to come

"This will have a totally negative impact on every student in Halton."

But Ms Andrew said JK has many benefits and cited several studies to support her viewpoint.

"The long-term benefits far outweigh the costs," she said.

"And it ensures children who need extra attention don't slip through the cracks."

Phasing in JK would minimize the impact, said Ms Andrew. "At this stage we would not lose help for early learning students," she said.

No portables would be required to start JK and the program is being offered in equal proportions in the board's three geographical areas, she noted.

Students going elsewhere

Adding JK would reduce the board's accommodation surplus by 300 spaces and bring it closer to obtaining new school funding, said the trustee.

"I've had many calls asking about JK and when I tell them we don't have it, some parents say they'll enroll the students in the separate school system," she said.

Burlington Trustee Michael Ellis said the benefits of JK are undeniable and board members need to consider this when weighing the proposal against cost factors.

"Junior kindergarten should be part of our vision and we need to start it now," he

After making a pit stop in Milton last month, Santa will soon be feted in the Campbellville Christmas Parade Sunday, Dec. 19.




