Merchants sweep series with big rallies



The Raiders drew first blood, but the Merchants responded with a knockout blow.

That was how the action enfolded in both halves of this past weekend's emotionally charged home-and-home showdown between the two top teams in the Ontario Provincial Jr. A Hockey League's West Conference.

Milton — delivering what could very well prove to be a watershed moment in their season — climbed out of an early hole each evening to earn the sweep and reclaim sole possession of first place.



"We played really honest hockey this weekend," said coach Marty Williamson, whose team is unbeaten in nine games and now stands at 21-4-1-3. "We dominated over the last two periods

of both games and didn't get sucked into their antics."

Georgetown led by two goals after period one of each contest — 2-0 Friday and 3-1 Saturday — but from that point on their momentum and offense were completely crippled.

That was mainly the doing of Joel Cameron Friday.

The Merchant goalie gave his first legitimate masterpiece of the year, stopping 34 of 36 shots to steal the

Ian Malcolm victory for his team. His efforts were highlighted by dynamite glove work and a 14-save performance in the second period.

Remarked Cameron, "It was by far my best game. I was the most focused for this one and could really see everything out there."

Phil Barski led the uprising — figuring in all three goals.

The Merchants scoring leader notched two of them himself, including the game winner which came less than a minute into the final frame.

Beating Raider Jeff Hladysh for the tying tally was steadily improving defenceman Chris Kerr. Milton's last two goals came on the powerplay — as did the second one by Georgetown.

Raider goals, deposited four minutes apart in the first period, were posted by Mike Knoepfli and Tristan Fairbarn.

They outchanced Milton for much of the night but just couldn't find the net after their opening outburst.


Saturday Georgetown rode an even greater high early on, potting two goals in the final minute of period one to go up 3-1.


But once more, their house of cards came crumbling down. This time around, it had more to do with their opponents' suffocating defence and team work than stellar netminding, although Cameron certainly offered a credible performance.

Also, Milton's big guns were able to produce where their counterparts couldn't.

Sniper Ian Malcolm banked his 21st and 22nd goals of the year and Barski scored on the powerplay to extend his point-getting streak to 11 games.
