While Natasha didn't come away with grand championship honours like big brother did last year, she was impressive and consistent throughout the multi-event competition which combined to put her among the top age class riders in North America.

The 12-year-old racer gained momentum as the week wore on and punctuated things with a fourth-place

showing in the mains during the final round of the Christmas Classic.

This was one spot better than she'd fared on day one of the event. Before that, she made it to the semifinals of the President's Cup December 27.


