There are other options in Drury land proposal

As a resident backing onto the proposed development at E.C. Drury I have been against the idea of any form of housing while supporting the need for a nursing home. We hope for rain next year. A lot of rivers are now streams and streams are dried up -- bad for our fishing.


All the best to you all in the year 2000. I was born on Eglinton Avenue West on the border of 10th Line.




