

About 55 per cent of Bruce Trail lands privately owned

# Association sets out to secure entire route

The Bruce Trail Association wants to 'Realize the Dream' by securing unprotected lands by 2015.

While about 45 per cent of the trail is secured (land either owned by the association, the government or conservation areas), the rest of the trail — approximately 440 km or 55 per cent — is still privately owned.

In Halton, the Bruce Trail winds across more than 90 km of land, with 19 km of it still unsecured.

And while most of the landowners have given the association permission to use their lands, contracts have never been signed.

"It's the grace of the landlords or landladies," that people are allowed on their property, said Richard Boehnke, president of the Bruce Trail Association. "It's usually a handshake deal which makes it a little tenuous."

#### Making deals time-consuming

The problem with a verbal agreement is that the deal often has to be renegotiated when owners change.

To help fund initiatives to secure the entire trail, the Bruce Trail Association has launched its 'Realize the Dream by 2015' program.

The program works by selling footsteps of land. The association figures there are approximately 1.5 million footsteps left to secure along the Bruce Trail.

When a person purchases one footstep for \$25, the association will purchase three more.

"The Niagara Escarpment is a rich ecological system," said Roger Taylor, a member of the Bruce Trail Association and former chair of the group's environmental committee. "It's also fragile and easily destroyed. It definitely needs protection."

#### Several options for securing lands

The association has several options. It can buy the property outright, buy access to it or have the landowners donate the land.

And the goal is to have the trail completely secured by 2015.

"It took 30 years to get 45 per cent of the land tightened down," Mr. Boehnke said. "We didn't want it to take another 30 to 40 years to get the rest. We set a tight target that is realistic and keeps us moving."

The Bruce Trail is a path that runs 800 km along the Niagara Escarpment.

In 1990, it was designated a World Biosphere Reserve by the

United Nations on Education and Scientific and Cultural Organization.

It has the same importance as the Galapagos Islands and the

Florida Everglades.

"The Niagara Escarpment offers some unique features onto itself and some unique features onto Southern Ontario," Mr. Boehnke said.

"People don't realize how significant the escarpment really is. It has pretty heavy company."

The Bruce Trail Association formed in 1961 after members of the Ontario Naturalist Association wanted a walking trail along the Niagara Escarpment.

The group set out to provide public access to the escarpment so people could enjoy its beauty and promote conservation in the process.
