

A plan before the Halton District School Board to build nine new schools in Milton while closing three others has won the guarded approval of Milton Trustee Erica Andrew.

# Catholic student renounces his faith

A Halton Catholic student has renounced his religion in order to avoid compulsory religious education classes, but the Halton Catholic District School Board says he's still a Catholic in their eyes.

Marcus Dagenais, a grade 11 student at Bishop Reding High School in Milton, wrote a letter to the board's director of education Fred Sweeney complaining the board discriminates against Catholic students by forcing them to take religious education courses that non-Catholics may be exempted from.

"Please consider from this point forward that I am no longer Roman Catholic from the Halton Catholic District School Board's perspective," reads the letter from

lion plan would bring 41 new schools to growth areas throughout Halton over the next 20 years. And it would close 15 others that don't have the student base to support them.

With its population expected to skyrocket to 85,000 over the next 16 years, Milton was fingered as a priority by the consultants.

Their plan allots Milton seven new elementary schools by 2016. Construction of the first would likely begin in 2002 with two others launching in 2003 and a fourth in 2004.

"They agreed Milton could get a school in 2002 because we can deal with our population until then," said Ms Andrew.
