Local taxi business owner shot

Rainbow Taxi operator left for dead outside Oakville home

expected to recover after being shot several times outside his Oakville home Saturday night.

Harcharan Singh Brar, 39, who owns the Rainbow Taxi and Limousine Service on Ontario Street, had just gotten out of his vehicle and was going inside his home when he was approached by someone from the

front, according to Halton Regional Police.

He was shot in the upper torso.

Det. Sgt. Ken Cormier of the major crime bureau said the incident wasn't a random attack and Mr. Brar "was the target of the shooting."

The father of three children was taken to Oakville- Trafalgar Memorial Hospital by ambulance.

He was stabilized, then transferred to Sunnybrook Health Sciences Centre in Toronto.

His family was at home at the time of the 8:40 p.m. shooting.

Mr. Brar is expected to recover cle. from his injuries.

The Champion A Milton business owner is Date rape drug' chemical found

Halton Regional Police found 39 gallons of a chemical used in making a date rape drug at Tremaine and Britannia roads recently.

Acting on information from

Chatham Kent police, investigators discovered the gammabutyrolactone (GBL) in eight plastic gasoline cans in a cement culvert February 16.

In its present state, GBL isn't restricted by the Controlled Drug and Substance Act, said Det. Bruce Mitchell of Halton police's drug and morality bureau.

GBL is available commercially and is used to make paint thinners, PVC's and textiles, he said.

It can also be used to make the date rape drug gamma-hydroxybutrate (GHB). On the street GHB is called 'Easy Lay', 'Gamma', 'Grievous Bodily Harm' and 'Liquid E'.
