Police seeking break-in suspect

Youth charged with mischief

A 15-year-old Milton youth was charged with mischief after police saw a suspect spray paint the walls of the Milton Curling Club.

On March 8 at about 11:30 a.m., a Halton Regional Police officer watched a youth spray graffiti on the Millside Drive building, said Det. Larry Brassard.

Two other youths were also present, police said.

Knife left behind

The person who broke into a Wilson Drive home during the day March 7 didn't take anything, but left something behind.

The suspect, who gained entry by forcing open a rear ground-level patio door, left a large knife at the home.

Arrest made in break-in

Halton police recently arrested a man in connection with a break-in at a Guelph Line home January 15. After breaking into the home, a thief stole the keys to a 1997 BMW and drove off in the \$52,000 vehicle that was parked in the driveway. The car was recovered in Sudbury.

A 24-year-old man was charged with break and enter, theft, the use of a stolen credit card, possession of stolen property and breach of probation.

Something thrown through window

Something was thrown at a kitchen window of a Bell Street home last Friday.

A woman was standing in her kitchen when a window was smashed, police said.

Nothing was seen or recovered at the scene. There was about \$250 in damages.

Youth charged with break and enter

A 14-year-old youth was arrested March 9 in connection with a February 21 break-in at a Bell Street home.

In the break-in, the owners of the home heard a noise coming from the kitchen. When they investigated, they found a male youth standing in the kitchen.

The suspect was charged with break and enter, breach of recognition and breach of probation.

Tools stolen from construction site

About \$8,000 worth of tools were stolen from the construction site of the Marian Courtyard Seniors Residence on Martin Street.

Thieves broke into the site between 5 p.m. March 9 and 7:30 a.m. March 10. They stole a generator, a hilti gun, an air hose, a compressor, extension cords and more.

Concrete damages vehicle

Concrete was used to damage a vehicle parked on Vanier Drive.

Between 1 a.m. last Friday and 1 p.m. Saturday, the back window of a 1999 Oldsmobile was smashed, the rear door dented and the roof racks damaged.
