Town of Milton looking at ways to boost revenues at its facilities

Staff planning new marketing concepts with goal of bringing in more money

Staff are hoping to bring bigger bucks into Town-run facilities through better business practices.

To that end, business plans for the Milton Seniors' Activity Centre, Milton Leisure Centre, John Tonelli Sports Centre and Milton Memorial Arena came under the microscope at the Town's social services committee meeting last week.

All three plans were received without comment at the March 6 meeting. But the ride may get rockier once the facilities apply for Town money during operating budget deliberations later this month.

Goal 10 per cent

Embracing marketing concepts and tracking demographics is one way the Leisure Centre hopes to rake in revenues in 2000 and beyond, said the centre's coordinator of aquatics and active living Patrick D'Almada.

The goal, he said, is to hike total revenue by 10 per cent over last year's take.

Wall advertising and an expanded merchandising program should help, so will targeting an aging population in the hopes of boosting membership, said Mr. D'Almada.

These measures should help the centre finish off 2000 in sound fiscal shape.

In 1999, total expenditures were \$469,000, with total revenues coming in at \$430,000. That resulted in an overall loss of \$38,000.

But 2000 is projected to have a \$43,000 surplus as projected revenues top out at \$543,000, while expenditures are estimated at \$500,000.

Last year, the centre reported a 6 per cent increase in annual visits, from 178,500 to 190,800. Pool rentals added up to 1,427 hours, while

facility rentals came in at 1,072 hours.

"A lot of this we think is attributed to the nice weather we've been having and the good economy," said Mr. D'Almada.

To keep attracting members, the leisure centre will have to keep a keen eye on shifting population needs, Mr. D'Almada said.

"Cultural needs will begin changing," he said. "And we'll see a change in the demographic again back to young children."

At budget time, staff ask for funds to expand the weight room and pump up cardio equipment.

Participation rose by 14 per cent at the seniors' centre last year, said its coordinator of community development, Joy Anderson.

"I think we're providing a wide variety of activities for our seniors," she said.

The centre boasts a core membership of about 200, but attracted 3,000 to a number of special events and day trips hosted by the centre.

About 10,000 drop-in visits were also recorded at the Childs Drive centre last year.

And those figures could be increased by another 10 per cent through an education drive aimed at letting seniors know what programs and services are available to them, Ms Anderson said.

"If things continue, we'll be successful in realizing that," she said.

We're well on our way."

Last year, revenues lagged behind expenditures so the Town ended up paying \$71,000 to the seniors' centre in 1999.

But that's more than \$10,000 less than the budget allotment of \$82,000.

"We didn't quite need all the money we budgeted for," Ms Anderson said.

This year, the centre will ask council for a budget of \$93,000.

Business booming

And business is booming at both the John Tonelli and Milton Memorial arenas, arenas supervisor Derrick Neelands told committee.

"The next few years will be a great opportunity for us," said Mr. Neelands.

We'd like to promote family values that seem to lacking these days,"

With a usage rate of 88 per cent and the annual participation of 180,000 adults, youth and children, the two arenas managed to pull in a combined profit of \$27,000 last year.

This year, that figure could be padded by the addition of an in-house arena board advertising program.

And money-saving measures for 2000 will include energy conservation and the streamlining of arena contracts.


