

Within the confines of John Tonelli Sports Centre, Doug Riding's team scored as early as humanly possible and then battled the rest of the way to trim the Rattlers 3-2.

This put them up three points to one in the OMHA championship series, which continues in Owen Sound Saturday.

Tyler Lafontaine delivered arguably the quickest goal of any local team's playoff campaign, bursting in off the very first face-off and slipping in a bottom shelf shot a mere 11 seconds into game two.

From there, the Sandstone Transport Winterhawks would combine timely offense and responsible defense — not to mention some crafty

cage work --- en route to their triumph.

Backstopping Milton was Adrian Eppinger. He was especially sharp in the middle stanza, during which he turned aside half of the 18 shots he'd face overall, and made a final glove save in the dying seconds of regulation to preserve the win.

Wade McGinnis netted the eventual game winner wrister. Also scoring was Brad Mazzocato, while assisting on the first two tallies was Kris DelNin.

Single helpers went to Mazzocato, John Cragg and John Riding.

A perfect penalty killing effort, three-for-three while shorthanded, was another contributing factor in the victory.

The previous day, the championship finalists tied 2-2. Eppinger guarded the net in this one as well while goals — both coming in the second — were registered by DelNin and Jordan Haggart.

Should they win in Owen Sound Saturday, Milton will have a chance to clinch the title at home Sunday.

Game time is set for 2 p.m. at Tonelli Arena.

'Around the Bay' is one of the oldest running events anywhere in North America — enjoying a 106-year history.


Race memorabilia dating back to the turn of the century will be on display and available for perusal by all those who sign up at the Running Company, 118 Thomas St., in Oakville.
