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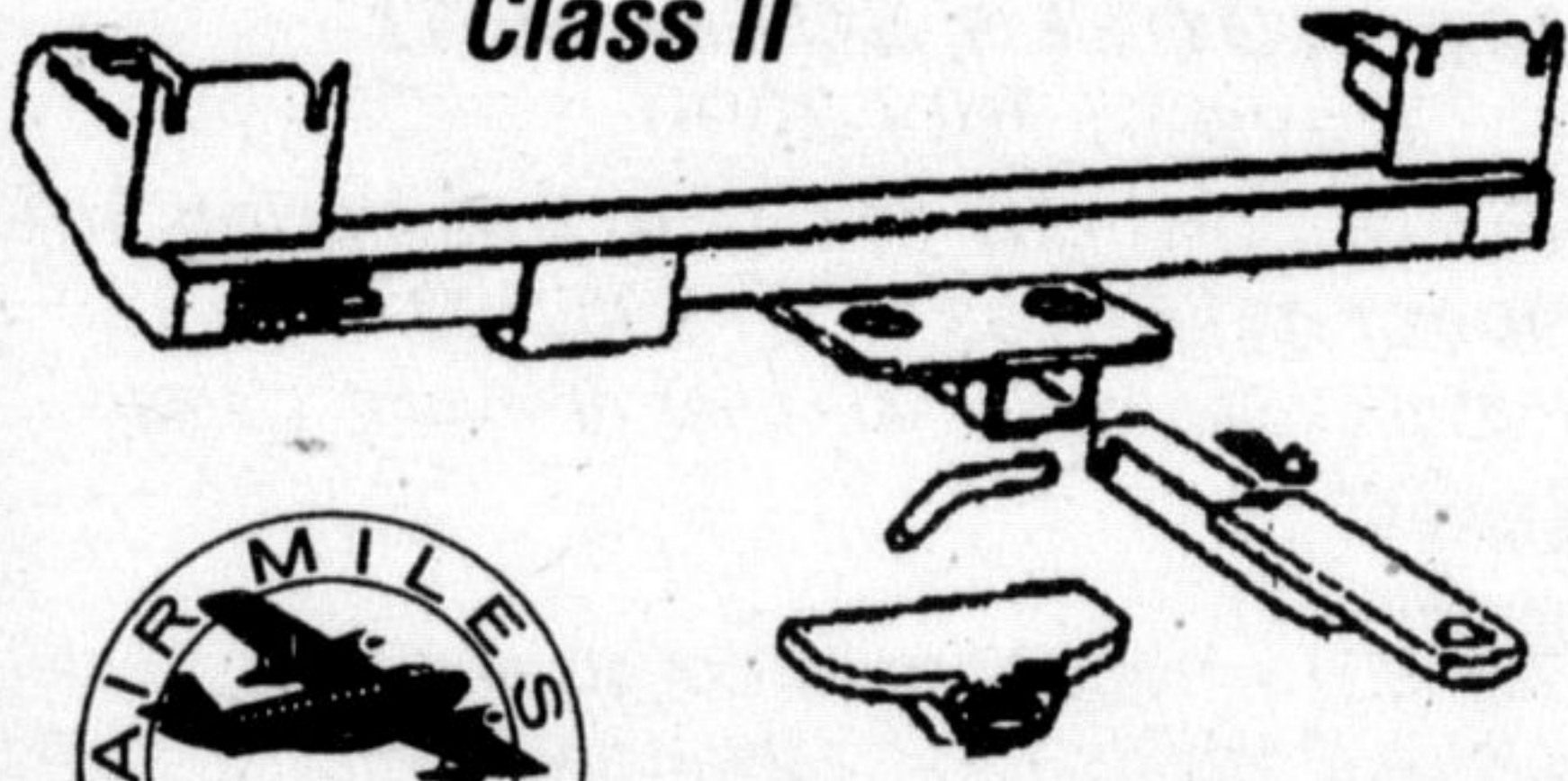
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'Big Pipe' is coming closer

The Region's big pipe project, due to wrap up this fall, has reached Burnhamthorpe Road.

The undertaking will help service new growth by bringing lake water to Milton.

That will help provide for a population spurt expected to reach 85,000 by 2016.

Currently, there are about 35,000 residents in town.

Construction of the pipe began January 24. Since then, concrete wastewater pipes and manholes have been put in place from

Dundas Road to Burnhamthorpe Road along Regional Road 25.

Excavation of a pump station at the Halton Waste Management site has also begun, and is likely to be completed by the beginning of April.

At that time, concrete work should start at the site.

Throughout March, the pipe will continue from the Saw-What golf course to Regional Road 25, and continue north of Burnhamthorpe Road.

Water pipes will be installed from the Hwy. 407 easement to just south of Henderson Road,

along Regional Road 25.

Construction work is scheduled to run from 7 a.m. to 6 p.m. daily. Where safety is a factor, one lane of traffic will be closed.

To prevent gridlock through the area, the closure will affect no more than 200 metres of Regional Road 25 at a time.

And as promised earlier, residents and businesses will be notified when construction approaches.

Road blitz nets 89 charges

Just shy of 90 Milton motorists were charged with traffic violations during the first week of Halton Regional Police's aggressive driving crackdown.

The 89 Highway Traffic Act charges, which included speeding, failing to stop for school buses and cutting off other drivers on Ontario Street March 16, were in addition to 136 charges laid in Halton Hills, Burlington and Oakville.

The ongoing campaign, which began March 13, was launched to reduce the number of traffic complaints, said Acting Sgt. David Cross.

He said police have received about 1,500 traffic complaints since January.

Police also want to decrease the number accidents, especially fatalities, on Halton's roads, Sgt. Cross said.

Each day, police are targeting a particular area of the region.

Police set up on Martin Street for about an hour Wednesday morning, but the number of charges wasn't available at press time.

In addition to the 225 Halton-wide charges, 20 other tickets were handed out for infractions such as seat belt violations and driving while under suspension.

In total, 247 charges were laid in the first four days of the program.

"Our ultimate goal is to make the roadways safer," Sgt. Cross said.

He said he didn't know how long the blitz would continue.

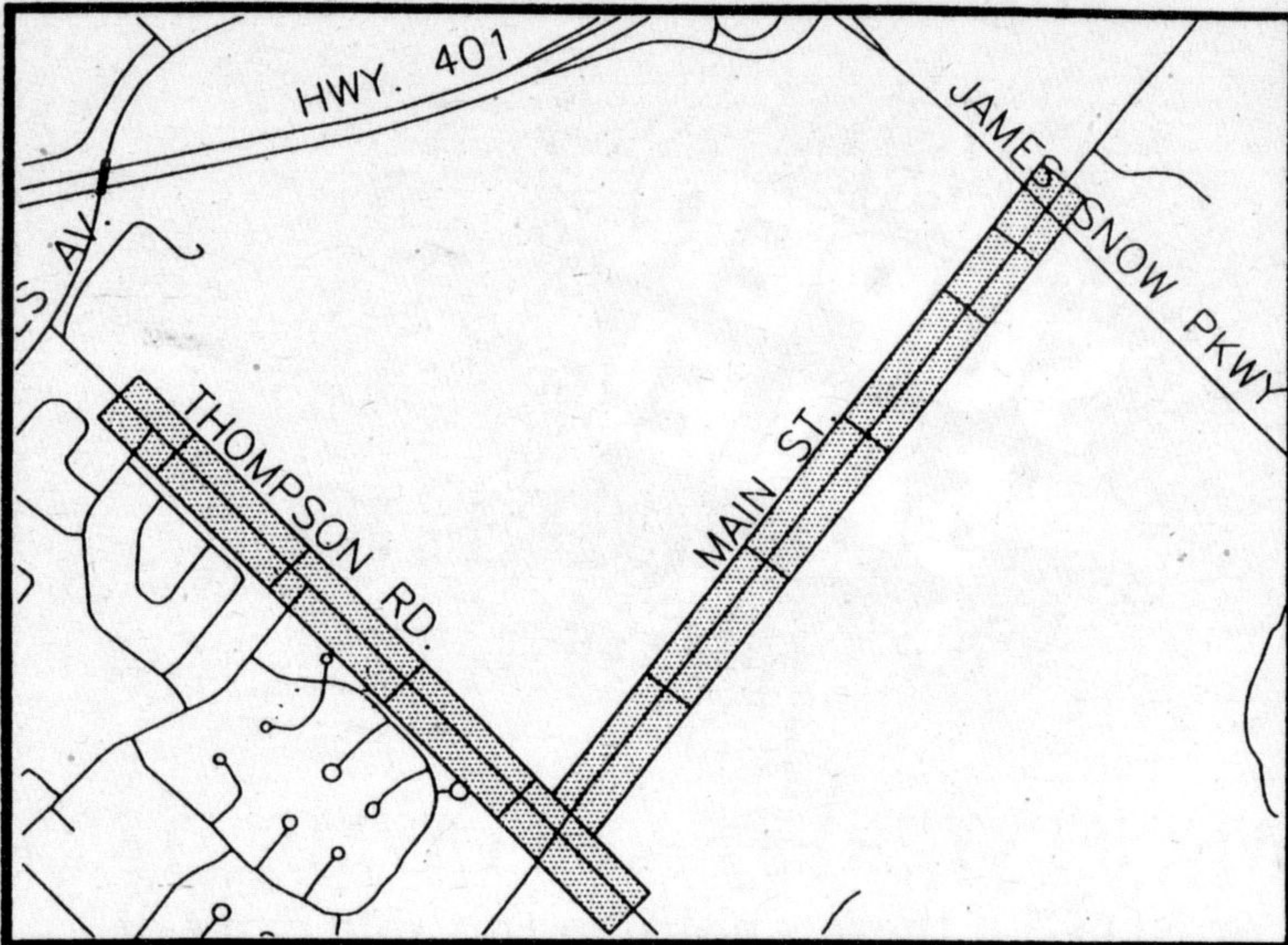
