The company is the largest industrial sponsor to the Milton United Way, donating on average about \$30,000 a year.


It does this by corporate donations, as well as payroll deductions and events hosted by employees, Mr. Gates said.


Mr. Gates said it's the dedication of all its employees that makes the company successful.




