

Mrs. Lloyd and 3 students from M.D.H.S. have returned from Nepal where they traveled to bring supplies to the school that was previously built in a remote section of the country. They delivered supplies such as books, clothing, school materials and medical supplies. Mrs. Lloyd and the students were accompanied by 10 other students and 2 adults from Nelson High School. Prior to the trip Katie MaGee, Brendan Coyle, and Jay Sakuta spent months raising funds for the trip. They were required to collect \$6000 as a whole for the group which Canadian Government's International Development Agency would match. The funds were used to build the school in the remote area of Nepal. After arrival in Nepal the group has a 3 day stay in Katmandu before they began their 10 day trek to visit the new school located in the southeast section of the country where there is no roads or electricity. The Canada School Project has been taking students from Halton here every other year for the past 10 years. This is a non-profit charitable organization which requires no administrative costs. All of the funds are donated to helping the people of Nepal. This was a very exciting and rewarding experience for all of the students and adults involved.

Lastly we would like to thank Jeff White ("Whitie"), the owner of the restaurant "Philthy McNasty's", for his wonderful motivational talk on Wednesday. The whole school watched this young entrepreneur who had quite an interesting story about how he became successful. "It's all about attitude!" Thanks for a superfantastic time, Whitie!
