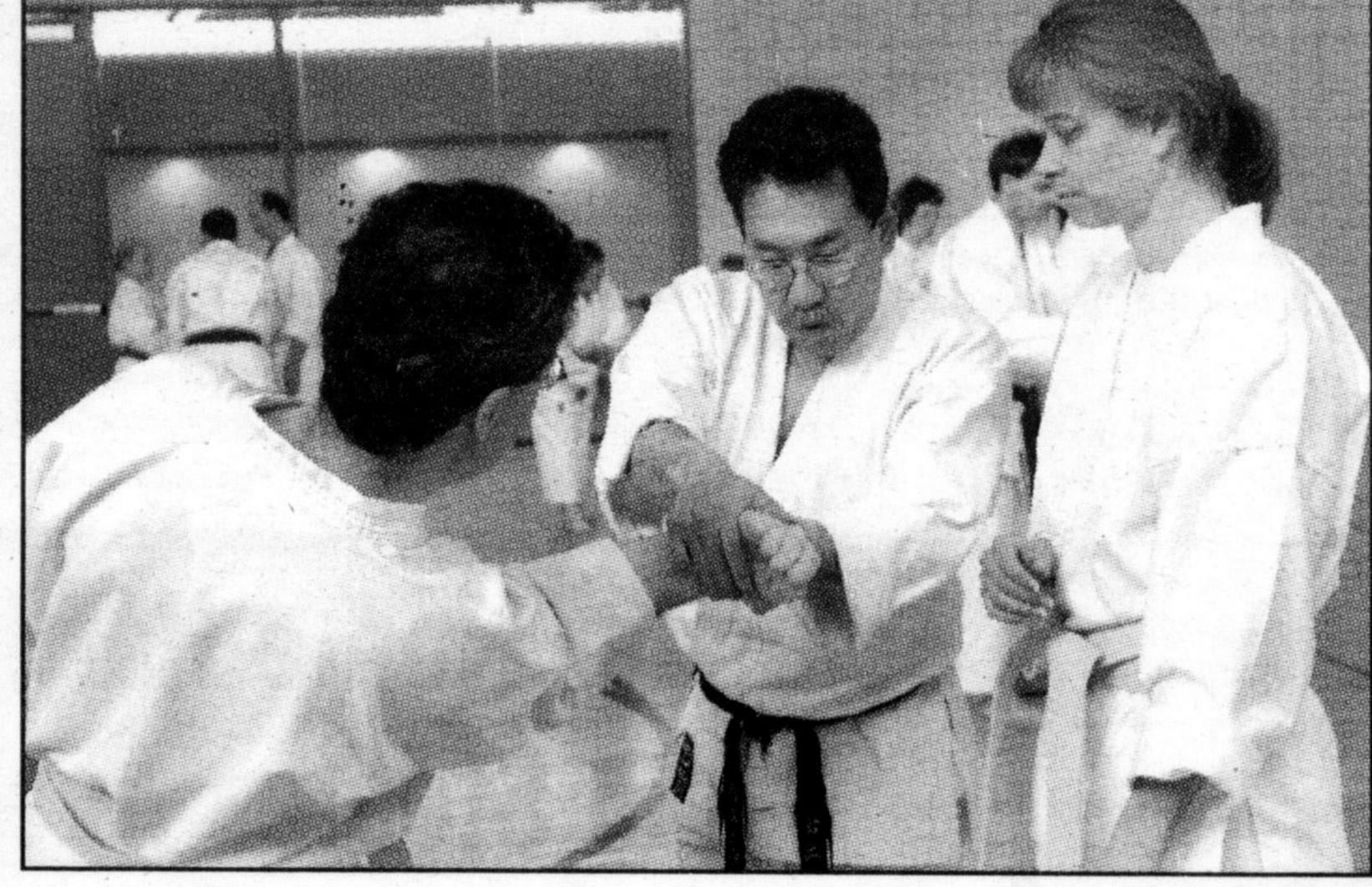

Karate on a bit of a high

ollywood has long portrayed the traditional martial arts fighter as a man who can walk on water, levitate in the air for eight or nine seconds while roundhouse-kicking a circle of thugs and looking strikingly dapper in traditional karate gear complete with head and wrist bands.

But these movie-phony's have in a way paved the road to the phenomenon now sweeping the fitness nation by storm.

Sharp yelps with crisp arm jabs and leg kicks have become familiar echos by more and more children, youth and adults around Milton athletic centres and fitness workout joints across North America. Recent health and fitness studies say martial arts fitness programs are surpassing many of the traditional group exercise programs of this decade.

"The general public may not be too interested in karate until there is a video on it released in stores. For others, they are lifelong trainees. They've had the benefit of spreading the activity over to their life."

Karate and martial arts have kick-started a new way of life for many. The big push now for the future of karate is to attain a total mind and body connection. More adults and children are expected to leap onto the healthy body, healthy mind train as thousands already have.
