# Milton Music Festival kicks off this Monday

Halton's largest music festival is coming to Milton.

More than 1000 musicians will compete in the adjudicated Milton Music Festival, which will kick-off Monday and continue until May 12.

When it's over, about 50 students will have received \$2,000 and \$3,000-scholarships.

The festival is presented by the Milton Music Teachers' Association and began in 1980 as a one-day annual event for piano students.

Now running once every two years, the event stretches close to two weeks and includes voice, strings and woodwind classes, along with piano.

They're adjudicated by a team of six musical experts who have made their own mark either as composers, examiners or professors.

"Our adjudicators are very, very respected," said festival coordinator Jan Carson.

Students range in age from 6 years to

their mid-forties.

Residents are encouraged to look in on the classes, which take place at Hugh Foster Hall (beside Town Hall) and Knox Presbyterian Church on Main Street from Monday to Friday.

Piano classes commence the following week, at the Milton Seniors' Activity Centre on Childs Drive.

Programs can be picked up in the lobby choose what they may want to listen in on.

And the senior students are a treat to hear, said Ms Carson.

"For the seniors, it's like watching a free concert," she said. "These kids are good."

The festival culminates in an afternoon Grand Concert Sunday, May 14 at Knox Presbyterian Church. Everyone is invited to attend.

Though the Milton event is the biggest in Halton, a new festival was conceived in Burlington last year.

And the demand is such that Ms Carson believes it will also prosper.

"They started one for the very first time," she said. "I expect it to grow."
