

The act also saddened Community Day Chair Len Lee.

"It's very sad to think that people would do that," he said.

This year's event was the eighth annual Community Day, and the first to be tainted by vandalism, said Mr. Lee.

Still, a good feeling about the event remains.

"All in all, I think it was a success, though there were some disappointments," he said. "We really had good support financially from the service clubs."

Local businesses also stood behind the event.

"It was a community effort," said Mr. Lee. "No one turned us down."

As always, youth organizations such as air cadets, brownies and girl guides were out in full force for the clean-up.

But the usual assortment of high school students seemed to be missing.

The scuttlebutt, said Mr. Scherer, is that the students were protesting a move by Ontario Premier Mike Harris to make community service a mandatory part of the curriculum. As a result, they seemed to stay away in droves.
