Mohawk to host top trotting colts in OSS May 19

North America's top sires stakes program will begin next Friday when Mohawk Raceway will welcome the three-year-old trotting colts for Gold Series Elimination action.

This group was impressive last season, setting track records at both Mohawk and Woodbine, and this year the incentives for speed are even greater. For the first time the Ontario Sires Stakes Gold competitors have a shot at a season finale and the purse and the purse rings in at \$250,000 for each of the three-year-old divisions, the richest events ever offered in the Ontario Sires Stakes program.

Entry based on points

To earn a ticket into the lucrative Super Final the colts must tally points in Gold Series Eliminations and Finals all season, 50 points for a win, 25 points for second, 12 points for third, eight points for fourth and five points for fifth spot.

At the end of the season the top 10 point earners qualify for the November 4 Super Final.

Of the three colts who earned more than \$100,000 in O.S.S. action last year, only Botany Bay has seen competition this season — but there are some impressive newcomers that look poised to secure a berth in the May 26 Gold Final and start accumulating Super Final points.

Topping the list of early season favourites is Elegant Supreme, who set a stakes record winning the Tie Silk Series at Mohawk on April 25. The son of Balanced Image, who made just one start in the Sires Stakes at two, stopped the clock in 1:58 to capture his second victory in four starts.

John Bax trains Elegant Supreme for Parkhill Stud Farm of Peterborough, Brian Parkinson of Sharon, Aline James of Lindsay and Brian Grant of Whitby.

Might have double shot

Bax could have a couple of entries in Friday's Gold Eliminations if Elegant Supreme's stablemate Armbro Thomas makes the trip to Mohawk. Another son of Balanced Image, Armbro Thomas won a leg of the Tie Silk, missed the board in the final, but rebounded to finish second in a May 9 contest. Parkhill Stud and Liberty North of Peterborough own Armbro Thomas.

A Grass Roots regular last season, Dell Ridge Riley may make the transition to the Gold Series after a 1:58.3 victory at Mohawk on April 27. The son of King Conch and driver Tom Strauss went from eighth at the three-quarter pole to first at the wire by virtue of a snappy :28.3 last quarter. Pete Gillies trains the trotter for Hornby's John Grant.

Next Friday's Gold Elimination will be the first of 20 O.S.S. events Mohawk will host this season, including the Super Final Night November 4, when a total of \$1.6 million will be up for grabs. This season is the richest ever, with \$15 million available to the province's top two and three-year-olds.
