In the summer of 1997, David Fiorino swore to his wife Kimberly that he didn't use a gun during a contraband liquor deal, court heard Tuesday.

Jail guards hit jackpot in lottery

There's nothing like winning millions of dollars to put a spring in one's step. So there's a lot of folk at Maplehurst Correctional Centre feeling spry these days.

A lottery pool involving some 73 employees of provincial correctional institutions hit the jackpot over the weekend, nabbing a \$11.4 million Lotto 6/49 win.

Most — but not all — of the workers are employed at Maplehurst.

The winners wasted no time in picking up their individual cheques, which amounted to \$151,000 each.

Maplehurst superintendent Iain Leithead said he couldn't be happier for the winners. "It's been a bit of a boost since. It's the talk of the place, as you can imagine."

Though the unofficial spokesperson for the winners had taken a few days off, Mr. Leithead believed the lottery pool had been on-going since at least 1996.

He said the weekend win has injected some joy in the correctional facility, even among those who didn't buy into the pool.

"The unfortunate thing is lightning doesn't usually strike twice in the same place," joked Mr. Leithead. "There's a lot of happy people. It doesn't happen in Milton every day."

The winning ticket was purchased at Daisy Nottinghill, located on Nottinghill Gate in Oakville.

In Superior Court in Milton, the jury listened to private conversations between Mr. Fiorino, 27, and his wife. The OPP had wiretapped the phones and bugged the couple's Brampton home.

Mr. Fiorino, a former Milton resident, is being tried for first-degree murder in the death of Stephen Andreopoulos, 36, of Barrie.

The tapes revealled that on June 9, 1997, Mr. Fiorino and his wife had an argument about a contraband alcohol deal that allegedly took place on July 2, 1996.

Ms Fiorino said she knew a gun was involved, but her husband denied it.

"I swear on my life there was no gun involved," the jury heard Mr. Fiorino tell his wife on the tape.
