



Roughly 31,000 Halton residents living in poverty

Buried amid the affluence, 9.3 per cent of Halton residents live in poverty, the Region's health and social services committee heard Tuesday morning.

According to the recently-released Halton Poverty Project report, roughly 31,000 Halton residents struggle to make ends meet below the low income cut off.

For a family of seven, it's \$36,800.

The report, drawn up by Halton Region in conjunction with the Urban Poverty Group, revealled that 58 per cent of Halton's poor were female, while 10 per cent were children under age 14 years.

But since the data for both the CCSD and Halton project were taken largely from 1991 and 1996 census forms, it may already be out of date, said Burlington Councillor Jack Dennison.
