Residents find strange woman in their home

Thieves can strike anytime — even when you're home.

That's the message Halton Regional Police are delivering after a couple of Milton homes were broken into Saturday morning while the residents were in their backyards gardening.

During one incident on Maplewood Crescent, residents went into their home through a rear entrance and found a strange woman inside.

When confronted, the stranger uttered a few words in a foreign language and quickly left the premises — fleeing in a mid-size beige sedan.

Also Saturday morning, a home on Lorne Scots Drive was entered through the front door, again while the residents were in the backyard, and an undisclosed amount of cash was removed.

Police believe the two incidents are related and warn residents to take precautionary measures to safeguard themselves.

The woman was described as being of European descent, in her fifties, about five-foot-five and 130 pounds. She had dark eyes and short curly gray hair.

Break-in spree

A number of break-ins have been reported over the last weekand-a-half. Incidents are as follows:

- · Approximately \$4,400 worth of stereo equipment and compact discs were stolen from a McNiven Road residence sometime between May 14 and 16. Entry was gained by forcing open the front door.
- Unknown culprits broke into the Italian Canadian Club in Milton Heights sometime between May 14 and 17. They forced open a rear door and, once inside, removed four bottles of beer.
- Tools valued at \$2,000 were taken from Greif Containers Inc. on Main Street, which was entered overnight May 18. An east side door was forced open to gain access to the downtown busi-
- · At Campbellville's Sand and Gravel Saturday, an assortment of tools totalling \$250 was stolen sometime between 1 and 10 a.m. Thieves targeted the side door during the break-in.
- Nothing was stolen during a break-in at Main Street's Honey Nails Monday afternoon, although there was minor damage caused to the front window. The incident occurred between 2:30 and 4:30 p.m.
- A lawn mower and garden tools worth a combined value of \$2,500 — were stolen sometime between Saturday and Monday from Campbellville Country Meadows. The rear door was used as the entry point.

Rash of vandalism

Our Lady of Victory, Milton District, E.C. Drury and Sam Sherratt were among schools targeted by window-smashing vandals overnight Saturday.

In every case, about \$1,000 damage was caused.

Drug arrests

Police arrested two men — one from Mississauga and the other from Toronto — and charged them with possession of a controlled substance following a routine vehicle check in rural Milton May 16.

A small quantity of marijuana was discovered in a vehicle at about 11 p.m. at the corner of Derry Road and Eighth Line. The suspects in their early twenties will appear in court in Milton June 12.


