

The Garden in June

his is one of my favourite months! Irises and peonies are flowering and there are fat buds on my roses. There are quite a few garden chores - other than weeding - that can be done this month.

Pruning spring-flowering shrubs is one chore that is often put off till fall, but there is no reason it can't be done in June. Any shrub that flowered in April or May produced flowers on last year's growth, so if you prune them now, they will have ample time to make new growth for next year's flowers.

You can prune for shape or for rejuvenation. If you are rejuvenating an overgrown shrub such as a forsythia, prune out 1/3 of the oldest growth at soil level. Lilacs can be lightly pruned right after flowering to remove the spent flower heads, but be careful -new flower buds form directly behind the old ones. If you prune back too far, you'll prune off the new buds.

Fall flowering garden mums and asters should be pinched now to encourage bushiness and more flower heads. Remove the first 1/3 of the stalk to just above a pair of leaves. For large clumps of mums, you can do this with garden shears; otherwise your fingernails will do -- but wear gloves or you'll have green fingers!

Staking of peonies, delphiniums, and other plants with a tendency to flop should be done as soon as possible. You can buy peony rings, but bamboo stakes and green garden twine will work just as well. One of the things I learned touring the English public gardens such as Sissinghurst and Hidcote was to use natural materials as plant supports - often pruned branches from woody shrubs and trees are put into service as unobtrusive (and free) supports for shasta daisies, mums, and other perennials.

Deadhead spent flowers to encourage further blooming on early flowering perennials. Bulb foliage can be dealt with too if it has browned; tulip foliage can be pulled; other bulb foliage can be cut back. But if it is still green, leave it! Photosynthesis is still occurring in green foliage, producing energy to be stored in the bulb for next year's flowering.

Don't forget, too, to take the time to sit back, drink in hand, and just look at your June garden.



Program has been established as a public


The Region of Halton's Adopt-a-Road
