The Region must stay on top of the contractors it has hired to ensure that the project is done properly and severing fence lines and damaging trees isn't doing the job properly.

If the budget cutbacks are insufficient to complete the tree replacement as promised, perhaps the Region should consult with the community to suggest they forego the banding, street lamps and stone

features in favour of additional monies going on replacement trees.

The community has a right to know, however, just what kind of financial constraints are impacting and reducing the landscaping and road features. I don't quite understand why there's money for an arts centre in Milton but no money for the tree replacement and landscaping and landscaping features as promised by the Region for the Guelph Line.

Perhaps a campaign to purchase and plant a tree by anyone who uses the Guelph Line could support the replacement program scheduled to begin in the spring of 2001.

This is my first encounter into regional government issues and it has been a disappointing experience. I thought governments were to protect the property and ensure

the quality of life for its residents.

I, for one, don't resent one minute of the countless hours our committee has spent on trying to turn this massive scale project into something that can work for everyone in our community.

I do resent all the time spent on phone calls, letters, council meetings and committee meetings when we are told by the Region that the budget "will not allow" for the original allotment of trees and other landscaping features. This project must be adequately funded if it's to be successful. I believe it's up to our local Councillor Barry Lee and our government to approve a budget that will cover the costs of the project as it was originally promised.

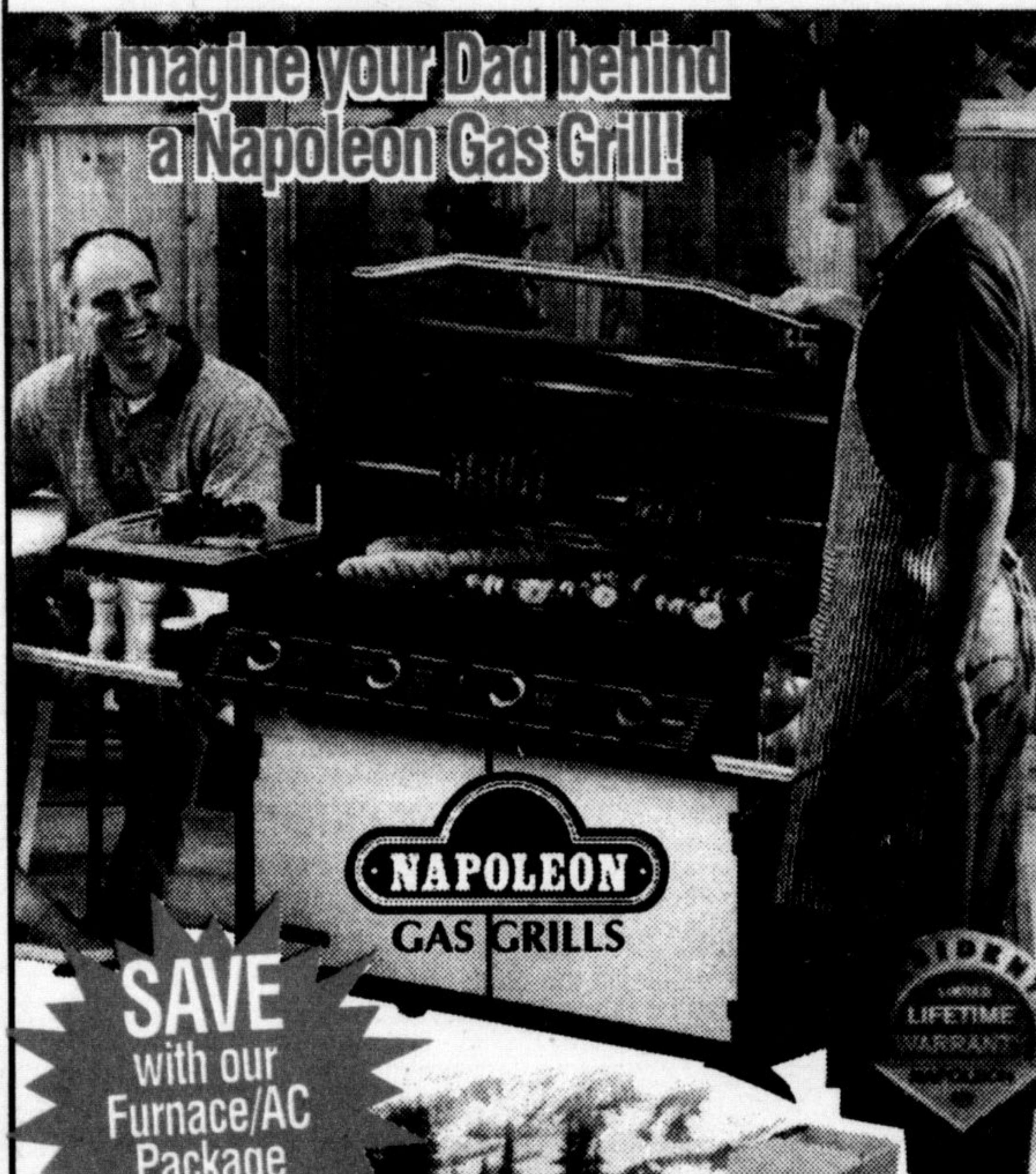
