
olourful balloons and flags swung in the wind. Folk music spilled out from large speakers. People casually chatted on picnic benches, strolling through the park or grabbing something from the barbecue.

Halton's first Gay Pride Day, held at Bronte Creek Provincial Park June 3, went off without a hitch and even managed to achieve the 'family atmosphere' that was hoped for by organizers.

About 100 people — young and old, gay and straight — gathered in the park to hear writer Sky Gilbert read from his latest works, to meet the creator of the "A Day in the Life" comic strip, Finnean Cole, and to enjoy the sunny afternoon.

Event organizer Kim Abbott of the Halton Anti-Homophobia Committee said she was impressed by the positive atmosphere.

"It's important to celebrate and affirm that we do exist in Halton region, that one in 10 people are gay or lesbian and we have families and none of us look any different from anyone who is heterosex- Regional Police officer assigned to cult to meet other gay people.

ual. We just want to have some fun and to enjoy each other's company," she said.

Ms Abbott, who was named the "most visible lesbian in Halton Department had display booths region" by Extra Magazine, said having the event in the park issues such as discrimination and worked out better than having a suicide. It also gave out free samparade — like other regions have done — in terms of safety and alleviating conflict.

The committee rented the park space, which was designated as private property. If anyone had disturbed the event, they could have been forced to leave. This provided better security than parades, which are put on in public places where preserving participants' safety is develop contacts in the community. much more difficult.

Georgetown and a member of the organizing committee, was at the event on duty to help protect people against harassment.

"For the people to feel safe is one of the most important things for us. If they don't feel safe they won't attend, so we don't want that," Constable Hannah said.

"There had been some people that weren't too pleased about the fact that it was being held, but I think the majority of people understand that we're just here to celebrate," she continued.

Increasing awareness about gay and lesbian issues was also a major theme at the event. Sponsors like the Halton Regional Health providing information about gay ples of sunscreen and condoms.

"We're not shooting for special attention," Constable Hannah said. "We just want people to become more accepting and to realize that we are just like everyone else."

Constable Hannah also pointed out that the event is a way of giving people who are gay or lesbian in Halton a chance to socialize and


