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
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
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First students graduate from alternative school program

or some students, alternative education is a step up from attending regular high school classes.

And last week, three of those from Milton's debut Secondary Teen Education Program (STEP).

It provides students between the ages of 16 and 24 years with an opportunity to earn their high school diploma independently.

"Some have been asked to leave their high school and they need an option or an alternative," said STEP administrator Barb Saxby. "This would be recommended by their guidance depart-

ment."

Last Friday morning, Dan Bunt, Josh Cluney and Kristen Townley all graduated in a small ceremony held at Milton Baptist Church.

"This is something some of them thought might not happen," said Ms Saxby.

That was the case for Ms students officially graduated Townley, 18, who knew as early as grade 9 that high school wasn't for her.

> "I didn't think I'd actually get it finished," she said.

So she doesn't regret switching her education at Milton District High School for STEP.

"We all got along well and the teachers were helpful," said Ms Townley.

"The teachers were really there for you. They'd help with per-

sonal problems as well."

This year, 18 students were enrolled in the STEP program.

Teachers are hired by the Halton Board of Education. Some work with STEP part-time, coming in to teach one course before heading back to their fulltime job.

Classes take place at X-Scape Youth Centre on Mill Street and last half a day.

That allows students to be employed while they pursue their diploma.

The program is already in place in surrounding communities such as Oakville and Burlington.

Last week's grads entered the church to piped-in music, decked out in the traditional graduate gown.
