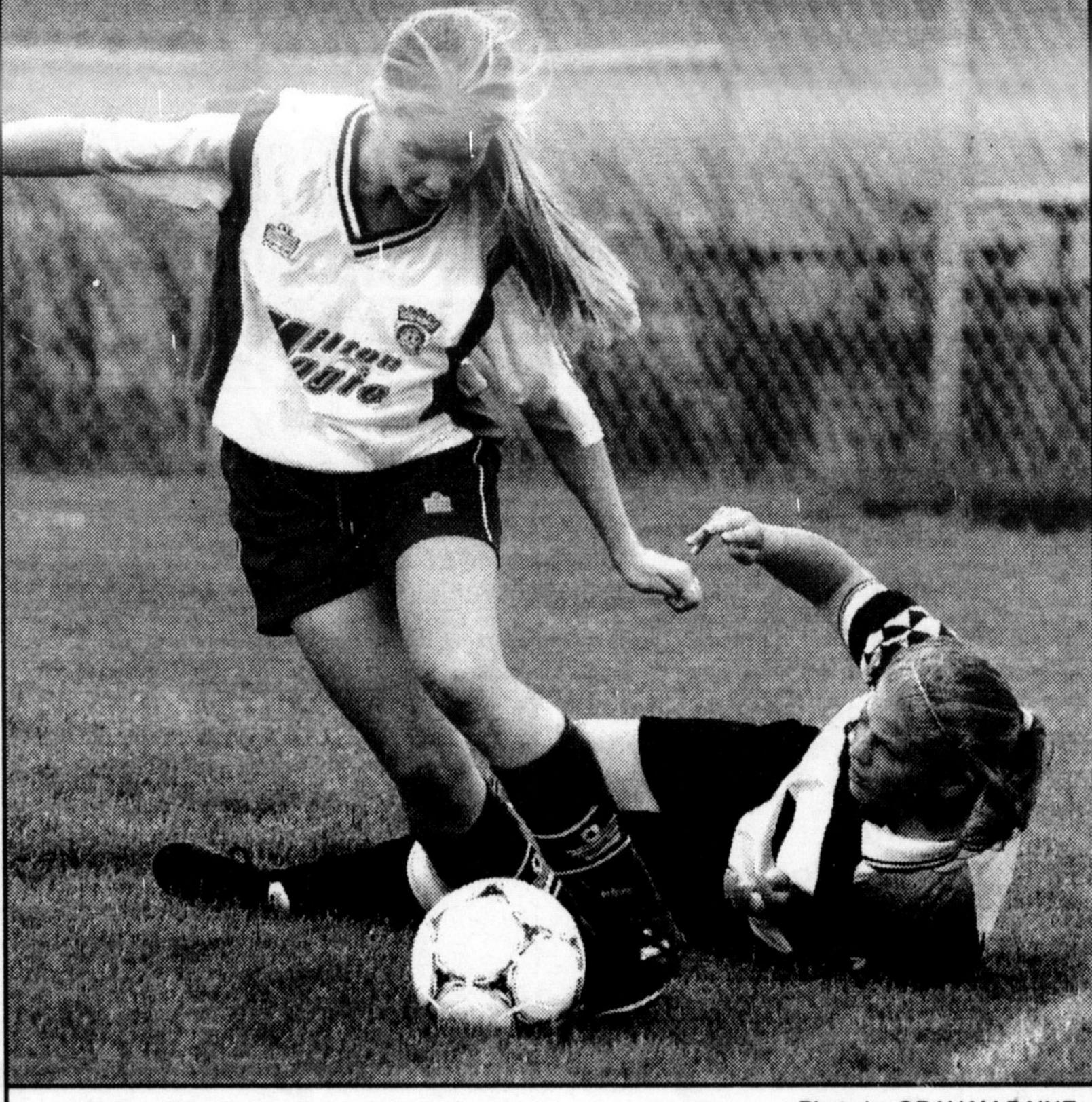

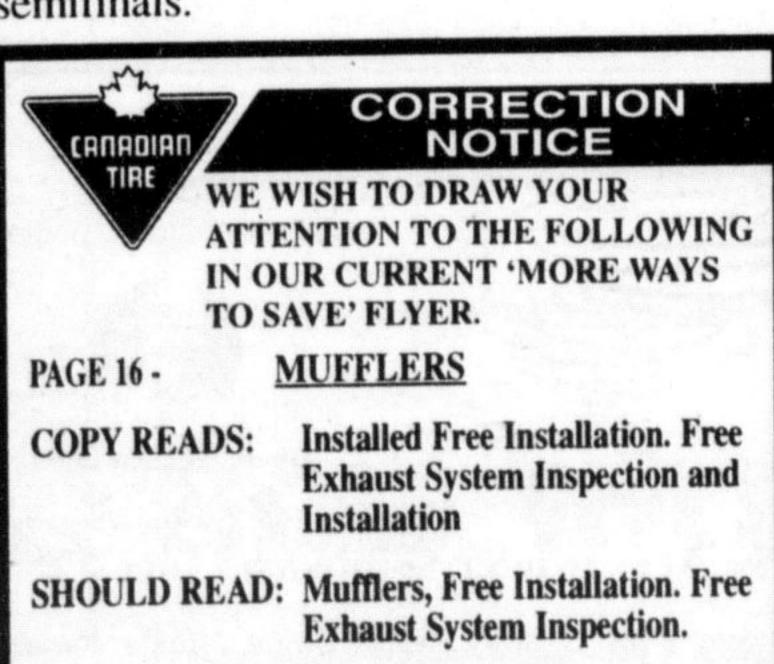
The following night the locals offered another robust plate performance to outlast the host Mississauga Majors 11-8.
