### Supporting and promoting Milton rodeo blackens entire town

Dear Editor:

Re: Milton Rodeo 2000.

It's with shock and disappointment that I'm writing a letter about such a disturbing subject as the Milton Rodeo 2000. I work in Milton and have come to really enjoy the people and the town itself. I don't hesitate to promote the appeal and charm of Milton, which is why it's so hard to understand why they would want to be a part of such a blatant display of animal cruelty.

Far from being a harmless diversion, rodeos are a cruel and dehumanizing spectacle in which man is pitted against animal for the sake of entertainment. Both man and animal risk serious injury or even death in rodeo events with one crucial difference. The human competitors understand and accept the risks involved, the animals do not.

Livestock used in rodeo events are vulnerable to all kinds of injuries ranging from minor cuts and bruises caused by rearing or shying while trapped in the chute to major injuries that occur during the actual events.

In riding events, horses and bulls are severely agitated by a flank strap, a two-inch piece of leather covered by a lambskin, which is tightened around the animal's sensitive abdominal area. During calf-roping events, a calf is released from the chute slightly ahead of the cowboy on his horse. The calf quickly reaches a speed of about 40 km/hour when it is jerked back as a lasso tightens about its neck, jerking it to a stop and throwing it to the ground. The force of impact can cause bruising and hemorrhaging around the calf's neck and shoulders, not to mention the sheer terror it must endure.

Fatalities and serious injuries during rodeo performances are not uncommon. (This includes peo-

ple as well as animals). The Calgary Humane Society reports that at the Calgary Stampede, arguably one of the best organized events in the world, 11 horses, one bull and one steer have been killed or euthanized since 1990. Accidents at touring rodeos (such as the Milton Rodeo 2000) are even more common.

Of particular concern is the inclusion of the Junior Rodeo Competition. Children's rodeo events, which pit unskilled youngsters against sheep as the ride or attempt to lasso the animals frequently, result in injuries to the animals. Moreover, they send confusing messages to children. How are children attending these events to understand that they should never mistreat their own dog or cat in this fashion when apparently cruelty toward livestock animals is acceptable?

Humane societies worldwide are united in their the entire town of Milton. opposition to rodeos. If there is any doubt about this, I suggest the "good" citizens of Milton con-

tact the Ontario SPCA in Newmarket or your local affiliate. Even associations such as the American Humane Association and the Calgary Humane Society, that have worked with rodeo associations over the years to improve animal welfare conditions and to limit rodeo abuses, remain opposed to rodeos in principle.

There's no place for rodeos in modern society, and certainly not in Milton. Rodeo events today bear little resemblance to past or current animal handling practices.

In Calgary, one may at least argue that the animal cruelty involved in rodeo should be ignored in favour of preserving what some Albertans regard as a traditional past-time. No such argument can be made in Milton.

Supporting and promoting such events blackens

Maybe.


We have had more dirty water on July 5 and I find that your explanation, along with many others over a long period, may be lacking four important words -- once upon a time.


