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## New program aims to clear the air at home

espite dire health warnings, butting out isn't an option for some people. But a new campaign aims to prove that butting outdoors

That's the premise behind the Breathing Space program, recently endorsed by the Halton Regional Health Department (HRHD).

"We all hope this campaign will encourage more people to take action to protect their health and the health of their children," said Halton's Medical Officer of Health Dr. Bob Nosal.

The goal is to clear the air — and save lives — by asking people to light up outdoors.

That should help reduce the number of illnesses borne by noxious second-hand smoke.

And participants are hoping it may also encourage people to quit tobacco products for good.

Breathing Space was born in 1998 with Durham, Peel, York and Toronto health departments as participants.

More recently, Halton and Hamilton have come on board.

### Program funded by Province

The initiative is supported by the Province, which awarded the health departments about \$800,000 to implement the program.

Advertising for Breathing Space will be seen on transit shelters, in newspapers and heard on radio ads.

A poster featuring a small, tow-headed boy with a sweater pulled over his mouth and nose to protect him is being distributed, along with a fact sheet on the hazards of second-hand smoke.

The campaign aims to clearly identify those hazards, some of which have at times been viewed as controversial or unproved in the past.

To that end, Breathing Space literature indicates that taking in too many lungfuls of second-hand smoke is the third leading cause of preventable death in

Canada, stealing the lives of 330 non-smokers annual-

And 4,000 chemicals, including formaldehyde and arsenic, are harboured in a plume of second-hand smoke.

At least 50 of those chemicals are known to be cancer-causing.

Ironically, secondary smoke contains more dangerous chemicals than the toxic soup being inhaled by smokers themselves through a filtered cigarette.

Ventilation systems are unable to filter all the harmful chemicals out of second-hand smoke.

Even less effective are non-smoking sections, including those found in another room of the same structure. For adults, smoky environments can contribute to

both a hardening of the arteries and heart condition in non-smokers.

That hastens the death by heart disease of some 3,000 Canadians annually.

Those suffering from lung conditions and allergies are often smoked out by second-hand fumes.


