Tasha Leslie led at the plate with two hits, including a three-run double in the top of the third that cashed in Harrold, Tara Elkie and Sarah Mooney.

Also scoring in game one were Carolyn Coates and Alicia Taylor. Shannon MacKenzie stood out offensively as well, registering two singles and a sacrifice bunt.

The midgets' sharp defense returned for its do-ordie second contest against Belleville Saturday. However, the locals' timely hitting was nowhere to be found.

They had runners in scoring position during three separate innings but failed to capitalize on every occasion — and were subsequently whitewashed 3-0.

The Mystics had only one less hit than their round two opponents, which made their lack of follow-through even more disheartening.

MacKenzie and Kate Moore counted a pair of singles each for the midgets.

Harrold and MacKrory were once again impressive on the hill, collectively allowing just nine hits and one walk.

Milton — sporting an overall record of 26-15-2 — still has a chance to pick up some hardware, during their league championships in Hamilton, August 25 to 27. They currently hold down second place, giving them a legitimate shot at the Golden Horseshoe ladies softball title.


