Along with 10-year-old Dutch Warmblood Catch 22, Vince made her World Cup Final debut this past spring in Las Vegas and will be looking to make a second straight trip to the international showcase that'll be held next year in Goteborg, Sweden.

The top three riders will be invited to compete.

The final Canadian World Cup Qualifier will be held at the Royal Horse Show November 8. In the meantime, Canadian riders may compete in World Cup Qualifiers south of the border, but may only count their four best finishes.
