

Murder trial ends with guilty verdict

David Fiorino will spend nearly as much time in prison as he's been alive.

This following a first-degree murder verdict for the former local resident which was delivered Saturday afternoon at Superior Court in Milton after almost 24 hours of deliberations.

With defence lawyer Robert Nuttall at his side, Mr. Fiorino, 28, showed little emotion as the jury's foreperson read the verdict — which carries a mandatory life sentence of 25 years with no chance of parole.

Mr. Fiorino was found guilty in the July 2, 1996 killing of 36-year-old Barrie native Stephen Andreopoulos, whose body was discovered buried in a Derry Road field 18 months later.

The two had been partners in a contraband liquor deal.

The silence of the courtroom was broken by the sounds of crying by both Mr. Fiorino's family and the family of the deceased.

Peeping tom apprehended Tonside

A resident of a Commercial Street townhouse complex apprehended a man who was seen looking into a home in the area last Friday.

The citizen held the man until Halton Regional Police arrived.

In one case, a woman awoke to see someone's hand coming through the window screen. The suspect fled when the woman screamed.

Justice John Bellegham asked Mr. Nuttall if he wanted the jurors to be polled.

Polling ensures each person agrees with the ruling read by the foreperson, Justice Bellegham explained.

As the court registrar read each juror's name, he or she stood up and said whether he agreed or disagreed with the verdict. Each of the 12 people said they agreed.

Justice Bellegham thanked the jury for their service during the lengthy trial and reminded them not to discuss their deliberations with anyone.

They were then invited to join the body of the court to listen to the sentencing.

Justice Bellegham asked Crown Brian O'Marra and Mr. Nuttall if they had any submissions to make.

Crown O'Marra asked for a DNA sample to be collected and kept on record. Mr. Nuttall agreed.

Just before reading the sentence, Justice Bellegham asked Mr. Fiorino if he had anything he wished to say.

Mr. Fiorino quietly responded that he did not.

Saturday's proceedings brought an end to the murder trial that lasted almost six months and included more than 90 wit-
