Mitchell got the winner with just 3:07 remaining in the game, when he tucked one in under the crossbar, while Birnie intercepted a pass in the last minute while Milton was shorthanded and took it in alone for the empty net insurance marker.

The juveniles, whose home games are Saturday nights at 8:30, play an entertaining wide-open brand of hockey.

It's been a while, maybe 10 years, since a Milton minor hockey team has been able to put together a group of players with such a high level of skating, passing, shooting and scoring ability.

Most importantly, it provides a place for local players to continue playing after they are 18-years-old.

"There are too many good hockey players here to give up the game so early," noted Arnold.
